The Indian School Bill.

The following is a full text of the Indian School Bill, introduced by Senator Stewart.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of the Interior be, and he is hereby, authorized to accept from the State of Nevada any lands which may be donated by that State to the United States for the purpose of establishing an Indian school, and also to receive from that State, or any corporation or person, any donation that may be made for the purpose of the said school.

Sec. 2. That the sum of fifty thousand dollars be, and is hereby, appropriated, out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to be expended by the Secretary of the Interior for the erection of buildings and such other matters as he may deem proper, in establishing a school for the education of Indians at Carson City, in the State of Nevada, under such regulations as the Secretary of the Interior shall prescribe.

SUICIDE OF MRS. CLINE.

She Dies of a Dose of Morphine Yesterday Morning.

Yesterday morning at about 8 o'clock Mrs. M. Glover, discovered that Mrs. Jennie Cline who was stopping at her house was in a dying condition. She informed Mr. Glover who was in the back yard and when the two went again to the room they found her dead.

Her death was so sudden that the Coroner decided to hold an inquest.

After the jury had been summoned Mrs. Glover discovered the remains of something which had been burned in the stove. As the stove had been cleaned out the day before and there had been no fire in it since, this was deemed a suspicious circumstance, and the rubbish, when examined, was found to contain the tin foil cover of a morphine bottle. It read, "Powers & Whiteman, Philadelphia. S. M., 1/4 drachm." There was a red paper crumpled up with the tin foil, such as the U. S. law compels to be wrapped about all poison bottles. George Thaxter, who was on the jury, testified that it was the cover of a morphine bottle, and S. M. stood for sulphate morphine. Doctors Lee and Davison made an autopsy. Dr. Lee testified that there was every evidence of death from unnatural causes. There was no evidence whatever of heart disease. Her death was the result of internal poison. Dr. Davison, who had assisted at the autopsy, corroborated Dr. Lee. The Coroner showed the jury a letter addressed to the public, signed by the deceased. It was a disjointed statement of real or imaginary troubles, and stated that she was tired of life and died of a broken heart.

The following verdict was rendered:

We the jury empanelled and sworn to investigate into the cause of the death of Mrs. Jennie W. Cline do find that the said Mrs. Jennie W. Cline was born in the State of New York; that she was about 55 years of age and that she came to her death in Carson City, Ormsby County, Nevada on the 25th day of January A. D. 1888, by her own hand and from the testimony adduced that her said death was caused by chloroform taken with suicidal intent.

By his careful, intelligent experiments he has produced cabbages that weigh 50 pounds to the head, onions that weigh five pounds, and tomatoes that weigh six. He has, by years of experiment, bred his vegetables up to the standard. He has also inaugurated a system of prizes. Those who send him the largest of each variety of vegetables raised from his seeds, get prizes all the way from \$25 to \$150, cash. He distributed \$2,500 this way last year. Mr. Maxwell, of Pyramid Lake, got a \$50 premium last year from Maule.

Several people in this city have tried his seed, and now will get no other. He sells fifteen fine monthly roses for \$1. They are simply monsters.

STEWART'S WORK.

The Carson Mint, and the Public Building.

WASHINGTON, January 22.—Senator Stewart of Nevada is proving himself a man of strong common sense, and is winning the admiration of men who differ with him politically. Up to yesterday the Senator was in favor of the appointment of Parker as melter and refiner of the Carson City Mint, to succeed Dr. Tuttle. Mr. Parker is a Republican, but a skilled workman, having been assistant melter for several years past.

In view of the President's policy to appoint the best men obtainable, and no Democrat having the requisite qualification offering as a candidate, there seems to be a strong probability of Mr. Parker's appointment.

On Saturday, however, Senator Stewart was informed from R. H. Dennis, for many years a resident of Nevada, and a Democrat, and thoroughly acquainted with the necessities of the office, would accept the appointment of melter and refiner. He at once notified the President that Mr. Dennis was a skilled workman, an honorable man and entitled to the place. His action has received the warmest commendation from to whom it has become known.

The squandering of \$20,000 of appropriation made by Congress to erect a public building at Carson, Nev., seems to have brought down the wrath of the Republican press on the present Administration. In view of the facts, this causes no little amusement here. The money was squandered whilst Miffin Bell of Pennsylvania was supervising the regime who were allowed to hold over a little too long. When his methods, however, were discovered, he was promptly decapitated and Mr. Frefet, the present incumbent, was appointed.

Senator Stewart is cognizant of the fact that Bell was a Republican and squandered the sum found to be missing. He openly denounces the latter's administration, and congratulates the President on having found a proper man to fill the important office which a Republican disgraced.

RIO BONITO COLONY.

Nevadans Investing in the New Colony of Butte County, Cal.

Ex-State officers C. S. Young & C. S. Preble are proprietors of over 4,000 acres of land near Briggs, in Butte county, Cal. They call the new colony Rio Bonito, a copy of whose map and circular has been received at this office. Last week they sold \$15,000 worth of their lands. Among the buyers are A. Abrahms of Reno, A. B. Miller of Elko county and Mrs. H. C. Mygatt of Virginia city. It is rumored that they have been offered \$145,000 for their property, but decline to sell for less than an even quarter-million. Messrs. Abrahms, Miller, Captain Melville Curtis of Austin and other Nevadans have visited the colony lands, and are enthusiastic over the romantic scenery there and the fertility of the soil. Numerous other Nevadans are talking of making investments there. Evidently Preble & Young have struck something as good as a gold mine.
