STAGE AND TRAIN ROBBERIES.

Total Amount of Spoils They Relieved Well's Fargo of in 1887. Chief Detective Hume, of Wells, Fargo & Co.'s Express, says that the company's losses by stage and train robbers during the year 1887 have been greatly exaggerated by rumor, and that the accounts published have given a false impression to the public.

He says of their extent that during the year there were seven stage-robberies and two attempts made. The total plunder taken by the thieves amounted to only \$295. All of these are known to the officers as one-arm robberies; that is, only one person was engaged in the affair.

The company's loss during the year from burglaries was \$579 43 During the year 1887 the company suffered by train robberies as follows:

April 27-The west bound train of the Southern Pacific was robbed near Papago, twenty-one miles west Tucson, of \$3,227 60.

June 18-The east-bound train near San Antonio and Houston in the vicinity of the village of Flalima, was robbed of \$5,230 46.

August 10-The west-bound train, near Papago, \$2,033 10.

September 16-The west-bound train of the Atlantic & Pacific, near Navajo Springs, was robbed of \$13,210 10.

The aggregate of losses to the express company was, therefore, \$13,210 52 by train-robberies.

Two robbers have been sent to the penitentiary.

SANTA MONICA BEACH.

It has been the custom for years past for many residents of Los Angeles and Pasadena to camp on the beach at Santa Monica during the Summer months by erecting tents and houses. Senator John P. Jones, who claims the water-front of his property stretching along the sea for half a mile, has taken early steps to prevent this custom this year, by instituting an action for ejectment against several parties who have already located themselves on the sands.

Indians Throw a New Born Babe in Its Mother's Grave.

A few days ago the negro squaw, "Topsy," gave birth to a child near the Tahoe lumber yard. Her sister was present, and she asked her to build a fire. The sister refused on the ground that during her recent confinement no one had bothered to build fires for her. The sick woman lying on the ground in a wickiup, then called for water, saying she wanted it ice cold. She was in a high fever, and drank such quantities of water that she died that afternoon, her sister standing by and offering no assistance.

Day before yesterday she was buried, and a council was held to decide what to do with the child. The fact that the dead mother was not a full-blooded Indian, but half negro, weighed against her. There was no one to take care of the child, and when the mother was buried the Indians choked the child to death, and flung it into the grave on the mother's breast, threw on the dirt and went away without further ceremony. The mother was always in bad odor with the tribe because of her mixed blood and bad character.
