The Prospect Well.

Yesterday the well borers reached a depth of 203 feet and at a little past 200 feet encountered a portion of slate or quartz.

The delay of several days past has been unavoidable and caused by being obliged to ream out a portion of the 3 inch pipe to allow the 2 inch pipe to pass down through the first quartz streak encountered. Everything is now in a condition to push on to the ledge which cannot be far below the present over laying rock which is now being penetrated by the drill. A drill of extra hardness had to be made to bore in the quartz.

Before Saturday night they expect to be able to get rock out which will give the long desired assays.

A MISLEADING ESTIMATE.

The Comstock Not Yet Played Out.

The San Francisco Examiner of Sunday says: Some of the Comstock shareholders, who have been wondering why the bullion extracted from the lode seems to have so little effect in reducing the weight of assessments, may gain some enlightenment by reading the figures in the abstract of the Assessor of Storey county, Nevada, published in today's Examiner. In the last quarter the gross bullion yield of Chollar mine was \$27,144 87. To get this out cost \$29,857 37, and the expense of extraction and reduction was \$11,900 more. The total cost of producing \$27,144 87 worth of bullion was \$41,757 37, and the net loss was \$14,632 50. Yellow Jacket does things on a larger scale. It produced \$196,441 64 worth of bullion at a total cost of \$308,143 27. Yellow Jacket would have been just \$111,701 63 richer if it had given its ore away before it tried to extract it. Kentuck got off easily. For the amusement of mining it paid only \$597 65 above the value of the bullion. They would be very unreasonable stockholders who would object to spending that much for the distinction of owning a silver mine.

While the above figures are correct, the conclusion arrived at by the Examiner is misleading. A bullion product and expense account of a quarter is not a fair estimate upon which to base the value of a mine. It often happens that almost the entire quarter is spent in what is known as "dead work," such as replacing the rotten timbers of a drift, repairing an incline, cleaning out tunnels, and a thousand and one things that are necessary to do besides ore extracting.

Mining is not like any other business; its expenses and its incomes are subject to heavy fluctuations, the nature of which is unknown to the miners forty-eight hours in advance. During the coming quarter the mine which loses money during the present month may clean up half a million by striking a high grade body of ore in some unexpected place.

The Comstock has barren belts, alternating with the fertile belts, and one must be gone through before the other is reached. You cannot judge the yield of the coming month by the expenses of the last. Suppose today the Examiner pays out \$5,000 for some extra piece of enterprise, and its total receipts for the day are only \$3,000, would it not be unfair to say that the Examiner was losing \$2,000 a day? The stockholders in the mines where no ore is being found pay their assessments in the hope that during the next sixty days a body of ore will be struck which will give them large returns for the money invested. The Comstock as a whole shows many millions on the credit side of the balance sheet.

Con. Virginia of day, paying its monthly dividends, after several years of dead work, is a fair sample of this.

A Bill to Protect American Women.

WASHINGTON, March 6.—Representative Thomas of Illinois had his indignation greatly aroused recently on visiting a drugstore to see a lithograph of the wife of the President of the United States with a disagreeable superscription used as an advertisement for a patent nostrum. He will introduce a bill, probably to-day, and ask unanimous consent to have it read, making it a misdemeanor to display the picture of any American woman in that manner without written permission.

This bill will be preceded by a preamble in which he will set forth the indecency of the present practice and will provide that the likeness of no woman, alive or dead, who is or has been the daughter, mother or sister of any citizen, of the United States, shall, without written consent, be used as an advertisement for any patent medicine or for any similar purpose. To do this is declared a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of not less than \$500 nor more than \$5,000 and imprisonment until the fine is paid.

THE WASHOE INDIANS.

The Desirability of Legislation in Their Behalf.

Hon. Henry I. Dawes, Chairman of the Committee on Indian Affairs, has transmitted the following to the Committee:

I herewith transmit for your consideration a letter from Hon. C. C. Stevenson, Governor of the State of Nevada:

The Washoe Indians, prior to the occupancy of the country by the whites, were involved for many generations in a most destructive war with the Pintes and their allies. The Washoes, although few in number as compared with their enemies, were a brave and warlike tribe and successfully defended their country, but were finally overpowered and disarmed, and compelled to accept most humiliating conditions, one of which was that they should never own horses or ride on horseback. Immediately upon the settlement of the country by the whites the Washoes naturally became their friends, and they have remained so ever since. No act of violence against a white man is known to have been perpetrated by a Washoe Indian. They are now from 600 to 800 in number, and reside about Lake Tahoe, Carson and Eagle Valleys, and Carson City. Many of them are industrious and useful inhabitants. Their children are bright and generally well disposed.

They have among them quite a number of aged and infirm persons who are in need of assistance. The citizens in the vicinity of these Indians have always been extremely kind, and have contributed liberally to relieve their necessities. The Government has contributed nothing. I do not ask an appropriation to feed or clothe those who are able to work for a living, but a small appropriation to establish and maintain a place in the nature of an almshouse, where the aged and infirm could be provided for, would not only be humane, but would be such a recognition of the good conduct of the Washoes as would inspire them with renewed efforts to become civilized.

I hope the Committee on Indian Affairs will make some such provision for these Indians during the present session of Congress. Such a provision in connection with the bill reported from your Committee, and which passed the Senate, for an Indian School at Carson City, Nevada, at which the children of the Washoes, Pintes and other Indians in Nevada can be educated, will greatly tend to place the Indians of Western Nevada in a condition to ultimately become civilized and self-supporting.
