**A BIG DAY FOR MUSGROVE.**

**He Wins Everything He Tackles.**

Last Sunday Pete Musgrove trotted his horse against one owned by John Bath, Jr. It was best three in five, half mile heats, for \$80.

There was a large crowd at the track. Musgrove won the first heat in 1:55, Bath the second in 1:52, Musgrove the third in 1:54, Bath the fourth in 1:55, and Musgrove the final and winning heat in 1:50. The fastest heat in the race was made by Bath's, which is generally conceded the faster horse.

In the evening Musgrove meandered up to Silver City with a fighting cock under his arm, and there downed the natives.

Three cock fights came off in Silver. Mining is quite active there now, and money is frequent. Johnny Susner's cock was pitted against Pat Quinn's, the owner of the Quinn mine. The Carson bird killed the Silver fowl by gaffing him in the neck, and Pat Quinn lost \$400 by the blow.

Kelly, of Gold Hill, then sent his bird into the pit against Angel's bird for \$200 and knocked it out.

Musgrove then pitted his red and black fowl against the winner, and after a bloody battle in which the Carson bird was badly gashed about the neck and head, Carson was finally winner to the extent of \$150.

After the dead bodies were cleared away a number of horse races, foot races and cock fights were arranged for future occasions.

Furlong has made a pigeon-shooting match with Hamilton for \$100 a side, \$50 forfeit, and next Sunday Musgrove will run a foot race at the track against an unknown, 60 yards. Musgrove wins everything he undertakes.

During the week Signor Enrico Campobello and company have been delighting the citizens of Stockton, Sacramento, Napa and Santa Rosa with a series of very delightful and financially successful concerts, according to the local papers of those cities. The singers returned to the city on Friday last, and in the evening gave a high-toned society concert at Byron Mauzy's concert rooms, under the Union Club Building, Northwest corner of Post and Stockton streets, to a large attendance. A very pleasant little incident is mentioned connected with the concert given in Napa on the 6th inst. Mme. Fleissner-Lewis was on the programme for the pretty little song "Waiting", and as Harrison Millard, the composer of it, happened to be in the audience, he gallantly volunteered to accompany the singer, which he did to the great satisfaction of the audience and their general and most positive applause. Mr. Millard was also present at the concert on Friday evening. Signor Campobello and his talented company are on an extended tour, and arrangements are completed with John M. Maguire for them to appear in Virginia City, Salt Lake, Butte, Helena and throughout the entire Northern circuit. British Columbia will then be reached, and in Victoria a guarantee fund of \$2,000 has already been subscribed for four appearances. The company will doubtless meet with deserved appreciation throughout.
