PACIFIC COAST ITEMS.

Sonoma vineyard Chinese laborers have struck for higher wages.

The City Treasurer of Santa Cruz has been sued to prevent the payment of \$10,000 to a San Francisco firm.

The first monthly shoot of the Alameda County Sportsmen's Club for 1888 was held at Bird's Point Saturday.

Geo. Hill was arrested in Albuquerque Saturday for embezzling \$12,000 from a firm in New Orleans.

Leon Helica, a negro, was arrested at El Paso Saturday for the murder of an American Chinaman named William Young.

A mild type of measles is prevalent at Golconda, and nearly all the school children and some grown people have the disease.

John P. St John, the Apostol of Temperance, has purchased a tract of land near Chico Cal., and proposes to build himself a home there.

Gov. West forced the Utah Legislature into his way of thinking upon several important questions before the adjournment was had Saturday night.

The arrest of Marshal Meade and posse while tracking train robbers by Mexican soldiers has caused excitement on the border. The case has been laid before the President.

A man named Stephens, formerly from Missouri, where he left a wife, went to Fresno county, settled near Selma and married a young woman, five children being the result of a union of nearly twenty years. His former wife wanted to come to California, so Stephens had the marriage with wife No. 2 annulled. Now the injured woman sues him for perjury and damages.

Dempsey Wants to Meet Mitchell.

New York, March 13.—In the interest of Jack Dempsey, Je-e-Denn has cabled "Pony" Moore, the backer of Mitchell, a challenge for \$10,000 a side, to fight according to the London prize ring rules, either in Europe or America, and allowing an English referee. If the battle takes place in America Dempsey's friends will allow Mitchell \$500 for expenses and if in England they want the same allowance.

Title to Railroad Lands.

In the case of Mar'coni vs. De-luchi in the District Court at Reno, Judge Bigelow held that until the costs of surveying and selecting railroad lands had been paid by the Co., the legal title to such lands was still in the United States and that until the legal title had passed out of the Government and into some private party no action of ejectment or trespass could be maintained by the railroad company or its grantees.

Whipped to Death.

CUTHBERT, Ga., March 12.—A shocking story of debauchery and the execution of popular vengeance comes from Bluffton. A white woman had become intimate with a negro named Aaron Dickey, well known as a desperado. A party of young men seeing the negro enter the woman's house, waited until midnight, when they broke in and seized the negro. He was tied to a tree and whipped to death.
