**THE REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION.**

It Will be Held at Winnemucca May 15th.

The Republican State Central Committee met in Exempt Fireman's Hall Virginia City at 1 P. M. yesterday.

There was a large attendance of members—every county in the State being represented.

The meeting was presided over by Chairman Boyle, Governor Stevenson occupied a seat on his right.

Winnemucca was selected as the place, and May 15 as the date for holding the State Convention.

April 28 was chosen as the date for holding the primary elections. The test for voters will be "Are you a citizen of the State and will you support the nominees of the Republican party?"

The selection of Winnemucca was unanimous, the Committee feeling that no Convention having been held there for fourteen years, Humboldt county was entitled to consideration.

In addition to the proclamation of principle issued by the National Committee, the following assertion of position on the question of Asiatic and European immigration, was adopted as a suggestion to the State Convention:

"In favor of the absolute exclusion of all Asiatics, paupers, insane, criminals and persons known as anarchists, nihilists or anarchists, of limiting further immigration, and a Revision of our Naturalization and Land Laws, the exclusive liberality of which causes the present undesirable addition to our surplus labor."

**WASHINGTON LETTER.**

[From our regular correspondent.]

WASHINGTON, March 9th, 1888.

The last Democratic combination is one that should interest every old soldier. It has been entered into by members of the House of Representatives for the purpose of preventing the Dependant Pension bill from being voted upon when it gets before the body. It is said here that Cleveland himself requested the formation of this combination in order to prevent his having to either veto or sign this bill just on the eve of a Presidential election.

The tactics to be adopted in the House to accomplish the defeat of this bill will include filibustering of all sorts by the members of this cowardly combination. Cleveland talks to Grand Army men whom he meets as though he would sign this bill should it pass while at the same time he is probably chuckling to himself to think that his friends will prevent a vote being taken on it. This is all the more cowardly from the fact that few Democrats in the House, with the exception of those from the South, will dare to record their votes against such a measure. The Republicans of the House however, although in the minority, will probably be able to defeat this well laid scheme to deprive the preservers of the Union of their well earned pensions.

Senator Paddock, of Nebraska, paid his respects to the inefficient mail service, on Tuesday. He denounced the management of the Post-Office Department for the last three years as a failure—probably a more conspicuous failure than any of the other shortcomings of the present Administration.

The Senate has agreed to an amendment of the Dependent Pension bill, which makes it apply also to those who served in the war with Mexico or (for thirty days) in any of the Indian wars.

It seems that the sudden change of mind which came over certain members of the Democratic Committee in regard to pleasing Cleveland as to the time of holding the nominating convention, cost a goodly sum of hard cash, in addition to an almost unlimited number of promises of patronage. Rumor says that the amount paid was over \$20,000 and that it was all furnished by W. L. Scott, the millionaire Congressman from Pennsylvania, and confidential friend of Cleveland.

The Oklahoma Territory bill, now pending before the House, is being antagonized by the friends of a substitute which provides for negotiation with the Indians before tak-

ing possession of any part of their Territory.

The President will get another chance to veto the bill to quiet the title of settlers to the Des Moines River lands. The House Committee on Public Lands have agreed to report "the bill favorably and] it is almost sure to pass.

Democratic newspapers have been assuring their readers that Mr. Randall of Pennsylvania would support the tariff bill proposed by the majority of the Ways and Means Committee as soon as it was placed before the House. Now when the bill is about ready, Mr. Randall's intimates announce that he is engaged in framing a tariff bill of his own, which he proposes to offer as soon as completed.

The Pennsylvanian will be sure to have some followers from his side of the House, which makes it extremely doubtful whether the low tariff Democrats can succeed in getting their bill passed even by the House. Of course it is doomed to defeat in the Senate should it ever reach that body.

Senator Sherman, from the Committee on Foreign Relations has reported to the Senate, the bill to amend the acts relating to Chinese emigration. He proposes as soon as practicable to call it up for action in the Senate. The bill provides that the words "Chinese laborer" and "Chinese passenger" shall be held to include and to mean any person of the Chinese race without regard to the Government to which the Chinese may owe allegiance, or to the port, place or country from which they come. Other sections of the bill relate to return of Chinese laborers who have left this country and to the issuance of certificates to those leaving.

By request of the Home Market Club of Boston, Mr. Long of Massachusetts, has introduced in the House a tariff bill which readjusts the sugar duty and gives a bounty for the production of American beet and maple sugar, reduces the tax on tobacco 50 per cent, and removes the tax from distilled spirits withdrawn from bonded ware-houses for use in the arts.
