THE TECHNICAL SCHOOL.

Some Pertinent Inquiries Regarding it from the Gazette.

Yesterday's Gazette has the following:

The papers of the State several months ago found fault with the Board of Directors of the Orphans' Home for closing down the mechanical department of that institution. The criticisms were sharp with censure, and from the general comments all seemed to assert that the Board were not true to their trust in ignoring the practical education of these wards of the State. The goadings of the press were such that made the Secretary of the Board come out officially in a lengthy card, assuring the taxpayers of the State that great injustice had been done to them. This apparently was authorized by the Board.

As evidence that their action had been misconstrued, the statement was made that a fund had been set apart by the Board as early as April last to add to the workings of the mechanical department, and that it was far from their purpose to permit the investment of the munificent gift of Senator Sharon to apparently be a monument of what might be construed as the folly of the former Board. This card was issued in August last, yet the doors of that branch of the Orphans' Home are closed. It is understood that the Secretary of the Board, Superintendent of Public Instruction W. C. Dovey, is an advocate of manual training. He is certainly a friend to advanced ideas of education. His official work has been of a character that it would appear like injustice to lay at his door the wrong that is being done the unfortunate ones who have been bereft of parents and homes, and home influences, by robbing them of the practical education which will give these youths a bent of mind that will induce them to take hold with intelligent and trained hands, and thus grapple for the necessities of life.

If the Superintendent of Public Instruction is handicapped in his effort in advancing the humane work commenced in that institution it must be by the Surveyor General, J. E. Jones and the State Treasurer, Geo. Tuily, who are the other two members of the Board. Relying on the spirit of the card to which the name of the Secretary was officially attached, the press and citizens of the State were authorized to believe that the good work would soon be commenced. Thus far, as advised, nothing has been done. It is due the officials and all who are interested in the elevation of those supported by the State, to know the cause of this inaction and to know who is responsible for it. Who will rise and explain?

Swiss Bell Ringers.

A Queer Accident.
