The Republicans of Oregon have adopted a ringing platform in which they remark: 'We depreciate the attempt of the Democratic Administration to degrade the honest toil of America to a level with the pauper labor of the old world.' We suppose the Chronicle would denounce this as 'know-nothingism.' For a time there was a strong opposition in the Senate to the bill to permit aliens to purchase mineral lands in the Territories. The distinction between mines and agricultural lands was not at first perceived. A vote was taken Tuesday and the measure passed by the handsome vote of 31 to 13. An amendment was added, providing that Territorial Assemblies shall have the right to enact laws prohibiting aliens from becoming owners of mines. This is a right with which such bodies may safely be intrusted. A Territorial Legislature would no more think of enacting such a law than the trustees of a Nevada mining company would adopt a resolution forbidding stockholders to pay assessments.—Examiner.

THE Y. M. I.

An Organization Perfected in Carson. On Thursday night the young Catholic gentlemen of Carson City, met in the Catholic Church and temporarily organized a branch of the Y. M. I. Richard Sullivan, was chosen Chairman and James Cahill, Secretary pro-tem. When the preliminary work had been accomplished, the Chair called upon Mr. Hugh J. Mohan, who is a member of No. 62, of Reno, and that gentleman delivered a very interesting address in which he explained the object of the order and gave a running account of its history. The movement he said, was inaugurated to bring young men together for mutual and intellectual advancement, by means of books, magazines, music, literary contests and social intercourse. The Y. M. I., has such development in view. Five years ago some 25 young men in San Francisco started the movement. The order now numbers nearly 10,000 young men of intelligence, temperate habits, and respectable connections in good standing wear the society's badge in California. Oregon is on the list in respectable numbers. Arizona, New Mexico, and Washington Territory. Nevada started the boom in Virginia City with a handful of men and only a little over a year ago. There are nearly 200 members there now with a ladies branch about to be organized. Reno began lately with 14 members, there are 75 on the roll at present. Carson sets the ball in motion tonight with 28. The Grand Organizer will visit this city on Sunday evening and conduct the ceremonies at Odd Fellows' Hall, where there will be addresses by Rev. M. Meagher and Hugh Mohan. After electing Dr. Guion, as examining physician the meeting adjourned.

An Honest Man. An order has been made directing that the Freehill estate, of which Frank Golden, of Virginia City, is executor, be distributed among the heirs. The estate is valued at \$250,000, a portion of which consists of real estate in Reno.—Enterprise.
