WASHINGTON LETTER.

WASHINGTON, April 13th, 1888.

Mr. Blaine is not sick. His general health has never been better. All statements to the contrary are either idle rumors or malicious falsehoods, and in either case are entirely unworthy of belief.

Senator Morrill, who is by the way the senior member of the Senate, having served continually in that body for nearly thirty-two years, made a strong speech Wednesday, on the President's message.

He said: "A tariff for revenue only (the banner imposed by Kentucky on the Democratic party) was a synonym for free trade. Henry George, a free trade propagandist, had characterized the message and the new Democratic tariff bill as a deadly blow at the ugly fetich of protection."

He then proceeded to discuss the President's recommendation for free wool, showing the prodigious loss to the farmers of the country that such a law would bring.

He said: "Deducting the protective duty, imposed for the benefit of American wool, of 10 cents a pound, the value of Texas wool in New York and Boston would suddenly drop 4 or 6 cents a pound."

He also discussed the probable future of the thousands of working people who would be discharged, if the new tariff bill should become a law. The speech was listened to with marked attention by Senators of both parties.

This week has brought out two new candidates for the Republican nomination for the Presidency, or perhaps it would be more proper to say that two more gentlemen had openly avowed their candidacy.

The gentlemen referred to are, Senator Stanford of California, who has allowed his name to go before the Chicago convention and has asked the support of the California delegation, and ex-Governor Alger, of Michigan, who has been interviewed on the subject as follows:

"I abhor personal methods and shall not go about from State to State trying to influence this ward and that district to send a delegate to the convention for me. Such means I consider disreputable. The office of President is a high one, and I believe should come to a man that does not require the loss of his dignity and respectability."
