STATE LAND OFFICE.

Report for the Week ending Friday, May 11th.

During the week ending May 11th, twenty-eight applications for State land were filed, embracing 9,204.22 acres.

Total, \$2,486 19

Selections were offered by the State at the local U. S. Land offices for the month of April, viz:

Carson City Land district, 14,101.42 acres; Eureka Land district, 3,131.97 acres, not including sales of lands in townships suspended.

Seventeen township plats were completed with abstracts and forwarded to the County Assessor of Lander county.
