A SUGGESTION.

Wipe Out the Old Rookeries and Substitute Substantial Structures.

The number of old rookeries in Carson are an eye sore to residents, as they also must be to visitors, and are a serious draw-back to the advancement and prosperity of the town. Every property owner is interested in this matter and should do all in his power to encourage the demolition of the rattle-trap concerns which so disfigure the principal business streets and the erection of handsome and substantial structures in their place.

There are many people traveling from the East, and from all portions of the Pacific Coast, looking for places to locate, and the number of tumble down buildings which meet their eyes as they pass down Main street cannot fail to impress them unfavorably both in regard to the enterprise of our people and the business resources of the town. Some of the most desirable locations on the principal thorough-fare are occupied by such rookeries, which, even if their present condition command fair rentals, but which would be more than trebled by the substitution of comely and substantial structures in their places.

Many of these are owned by persons abundantly able to make the necessary improvements, and their failure to do so, speaks anything but favorably of their business judgment, while their penny-wise and pound-foolish policy is a draw-back to the general prosperity of the city. In climate, location, resources and business connections, Carson cannot be surpassed by any town in Nevada. All that is wanting is a little enterprise upon the part of its people. A magnificent public building is about to be erected. The appropriation was secured mainly through the persistent and untiring efforts of our citizens. Let them manifest their appropriation of the generosity of the general government, by corresponding improvement of private property. It is not necessary to enter into details. A walk through our business streets will indicate to anyone, not totally blind, the locations of the buildings which must be wiped out of existence, before Carson can expect to attract the favorable attention of persons looking for places, either for residences or business purposes.
