Judge Murphy.

The Democrat and Mugwump papers have singled out Judge Murphy as a target for personal attacks. It is folly for any man to say that after Judge Murphy's experience as Judge of a District Court that he is not qualified for the Supreme Bench.

The attacks do not represent any sentiment among voters in this State but originate simply in personal malice vented in a small way. It is a new thing in this State to see a mud campaign begun on a candidate for Supreme Judge. We defy the Democratic press to point to a single instance in which the personal record, or the abilities of any candidate for Supreme Judge on the Democratic side was assailed by Republican newspapers.

Murphy has lived many years in this State, won an honest living by hard work at his profession, paid his debts, kept his word with everybody and stood by his party principles under all circumstances.

So far no insinuations against his judicial record or his judicial ability has come from any one competent to judge of such matters.

Immigration.

The report of Major Powell, Director of the Geological Survey, in regard to the storage of water to reclaim the arid lands, opens up a wonderful future for the Great West. Major Powell says there are 1,000,000 square miles of arid land that would be valuable if water could be obtained to irrigate them. He further shows that there are 1,300,000 square miles of land with an average rainfall of fifteen inches per year, which can be utilized to reclaim these arid lands. If all the rainfall in this area could be stored and saved it would give double the amount necessary to make arable all the arid lands. He submits an estimate showing that a system of reservoirs that would bring the waters of the larger streams under control would reclaim 150,000 square miles that is, 96,000,000 acres, which at \$30 an acre would add \$2,880,000,000 to the wealth of the nation. It is a fact well known in the west that when these "arid lands" have been reclaimed by private enterprise they are the most productive in the country. Congress should not hesitate to undertake the work.

Cohn's new Stallion.

PACIFIC COAST ITEMS.

—The Junction House, on the road to the Lick Observatory from San Jose, was burned Sunday morning.

—A petition is being circulated at Fresno addressed to Senator Stewart asking him to see that no reduction is made on the tariff on raisins.

—Two men assaulted Lizzie Woughtel, a young lady of Winters, Sunday. The citizens are much incensed and are out hunting for the miscreants.

—A collision occurred yesterday morning on the California Southern Railroad, about forty miles north of San Diego, on the Santa Margarita ranch, between a freight train and a construction train.

—The proprietor of the St. Clair Saloon at Redding and a former barkeeper named McClellan had a shooting match yesterday. St. Clair was shot in the back, knocked down and beaten severely.

—James Gooley, Michael Sullivan and Patrick O'Neill, three of the men imprisoned in the Lawrence mine cave at Butte, M. T., Sunday, were recovered yesterday. The crushed body of Tim Harrington was also recovered.

—Conrad Rohling, who was recently arrested at Fairbanks, A. T., for complicity in the Sonora train robbery and released, has been re-arrested and will be turned over to the Mexican Government, the extradition papers calling for both Taylor and Rohling.

—Charles Dakin, of the firm of Auzeais & Dakin, paint and oil dealers at San Jose, has eloped with Miss Alice Neumann. He leaves a young wife and child. His relatives, also those of his wife, live in San Francisco. Miss Neumann's father vows that he will follow the runaways, who are supposed to be on the way to New Orleans or into Mexico.

Conkling and Blaine.

New York, June 3.—George C. Gorham, in a letter filling ten columns of the Herald to-morrow, undertakes to do justice to Roscoe Conkling in the controversy with Blaine. Gorham says: "Referring to the famous scene in the House of Representatives in 1866, the records of Congressional debates show that the whole affair was most discreditable to Blaine, and that he was rebuked and humiliated by the House to which he had appealed to vote, wanting only four to make it unanimous." Gorham quoted freely from the records to show Conkling was the victim of a conspiracy, wherein Blaine, Garfield and Reid figured. Conkling was a silent martyr to intrigue and falsehood. He accuses the conspirators with having used the President and State Department to further their personal schemes and punish the stalwart Republicans.

Gorham's letter is the fulfillment of a promise made to Conkling.

Back to his old Quarters.

When the 2:45 p. m. train from San Jose arrived in Sacramento Friday afternoon, two tall men stepped from the cars to the platform. One was M. M. Drew, Sheriff of Sacramento county, and the other was Arthur D. January, ex-Deputy State Treasurer of California, who, while occupying that position, abstracted and squandered from the State's vaults over \$50,000 special deposits of County Treasurers. He was tried, convicted and sentenced to ten years imprisonment, but has been at liberty on bail, pending an appeal to the Supreme Court for a new trial. His re-arrest indicates that the Supreme Court has decided against him. He was taken immediately to the county jail where his father was waiting, doubtless having been informed of his son's coming.
