PACIFIC COAST ITEMS.

Cloudbursts have done much damage on Washington Territory farms.

Westly Best, aged fifteen, was drowned in a pool of water near Wheatland Monday.

The men who robbed a train near Big Horn, M. T., Saturday night were apparently a lot of half-drunken cowboys.

Ed Patterson, a rancher near Gridley, was crushed to death by the driving-wheel of a combined harvester Monday.

A school teacher in jail at Dallas, Or., for beating a pupil, accidentally set the place on fire and came near being cremated.

Thomas McNabb a saloon-keeper at Marysville, killed James Sullivan Monday by a blow, the fall producing concussion of the brain.

Andy Hoeflich, who attempted to murder Miss Juliet Craig, near Stockton, by cutting her throat, had an examination Monday and he was held in \$5,000 bonds.

There were three municipal tickets in the field at Portland, Or., but the Republicans were successful by majorities ranging from 399 to 2,429. The election was held Monday.

In the case of a Deputy United States Marshal, arrested at Portland for election frauds, Judge Deady has decided that the State authorities have no power to arrest a Federal officer while on duty.

The Crown Mining Company at Stockton was lit Monday night by natural gas and a public reception was given. The light is superior to the manufactured article and the company claims it will be the means of saving \$250 per month in gas and fuel.

The late rains have considerably increased the volume of water in the Clackamas river and this has set the salmon confined in the pool at the hatchery wild to get up the river. They move up in solid bodies and charge the weir, which prevents them from going further, as if determined to force their way through.

The Water Question.

The Carson APPEAL is trying to arouse the ranchers of Ormsby and Douglas counties to the importance of a system of water storage reservoirs. It says: "If the farmers of Nevada would consent to a tax of so much per acre on their land to construct reservoirs, they could build the reservoirs at about one-tenth the cost of crops they lose every Summer, besides saving the cost of useless and vexatious lawsuits." Were there in the country insurance offices at which the ranchmen could be insured full crops of all kinds every year, they would no doubt pay the required fee every season with great satisfaction. In storage reservoirs they have such insurance offices, and they need only pay a fee or tax for a few years, then they will forever after have their insurance free, for the work once properly done it is done for all time. They will fool around until outsiders from other States come in and gobble the valuable reservoir sites that are now almost going a begging. The man who (in a country like this) owns the water virtually commands the land below it. The man who has the water can always get land, but the man who has land cannot always get water. The man with water is boss.—Enterprise.
