The Inter Ocean says New York receding from Sherman and Gresham, Harrison neck is advancing.

The Times says the contest is narrowing between Blaine and Sherman, with chances in favor of Blaine, with Foraker for Vice President.

It is reported that New York will swing its votes for Harrison to-morrow.

The California delegation say they will only bring Blaine to the fore after it is shown that the Convention cannot unite on any other man.
