EFFECT OF THE NEWS.

The Nominations Meeting with Approval Everywhere

NAPA, June 25.—The nomination of Harrison gives general satisfaction to Republicans, though Alger was their first choice.

RIVERSIDE, June 25.—The news of Harrison's nomination was received with great enthusiasm, hurrahs and the firing of guns. The town in a few minutes was decorated with profuse bunting. "He's all right," was the universal sentiment.

MERCED, June 25.—The news of the nomination of Harrison was very enthusiastically received. Salutes were fired from the Republican cannon and loud shouts of joy given. The Republicans will hold a ratification meeting as soon as the name of the second man on the ticket is received. The party leaders are all satisfied with the nomination.

COLUSA, June 25.—Blaine admirers here were so strong that the news of the nomination of Harrison caused some surprise for a moment. The Republicans now are jubilant and should the Vice President be nominated this afternoon a big ratification meeting will be held to-night. There is a feeling of confidence that Ben Harrison will repeat the victory of his noble ancestor in 1840.

EUREKA, June 25. All the Republicans are satisfied with the nomination of Harrison, and there will be an enthusiastic ratification meeting to-night. Many who voted for Cleveland avow their intention to support Harrison. No nomination could give better satisfaction. An increased majority is sure from this county.

SAN DIEGO, June 25.—The nomination of Harrison was received here with quiet but evident satisfaction by the Republicans while the Democrats concede that he is about the least objectionable of the candidates. It is believed that he will be able to carry the doubtful States.

PORTLAND, Or., June 25.—The nomination of General Harrison is received with great enthusiasm by all classes. Crowds have surrounded the bulletin boards all day watching the outcome of the balloting. Harrison is considered here a strong man and will carry this State with 7,000 or 8,000 majority.

OAKLAND, June 25.—The Tribune says editorially: "After the withdrawal of Blaine this morning, the selection of Harrison followed easily. The balloting on Saturday showed that he was the strongest man before the convention. Being the choice of New York and Indiana, the two important doubtful States, he had a force behind him such as no other candidate could bring to bear. His splendid war record, his fine natural abilities and his long training in statesmanship make him a very strong candidate and the fact that he is certain to carry Indiana assures the victory for the Republican ticket this year."

CHICO, June 25.—The news of Harrison's nomination created wild excitement among Republicans. Anvils and cannon were fired and bells rung.

IN WASHINGTON TERRITORY.

TACOMA, June 25.—Harrison's nomination, while somewhat a surprise, is thought by leading Republicans here to secure Indiana. The President of the Lincoln Republican Club says: "With Harrison's unassailable record and a good man for the second place, I think under the circumstances it will probably be as good a ticket as could be selected."
