It is not necessary for the APPEAL to inform any of its readers how a high tariff will help Nevada, as they are all a very intelligent class of people, who keep well posted on the questions of day.
For the benefit of the Independent, a journal that does not seem to have kept abreast of the times, we will "kindly inform" it.
A high protective price will enable
The wool grower,
The lead miners,
The borax producers and
The silver miners,
To get a high tariff for what they produce.

A high tariff will keep the wages of American labor protected from the invasion of the European laborer or the products of the pauper workshops of England.

By keeping the American laborer of the East at work he does not become a tramp to come out here and overstock the labor market of Nevada and beat down the wages of our miners and woodchoppers.

By keeping wages up money is plenty and times good, and so we all get benefitted.

The Independent must bear in mind that a blow at the Eastern workshop is a blow at Nevada as much as it is a blow at New York. Of course a high tariff will compel the editor of the Independent to pay more for his clothes than he would have to pay if he sent his money to the English manufacturer, but with prosperity and money plenty in America he will be able to do twice as much business in Elko as he would if free trade were the rule. We therefore assume that he, being a sensible man—as we hope he is after reading this—will be willing to stand the difference in clothes.

The Albany Journal makes a point on its local Democratic contemporary which had charged that for years cheap foreign labor has been imported in job lots to take the place of American laborers. The Journal wants to know the difference between importing these cheap laborers and importing the cheap product of their labor.

The interesting discovery has been made in San Francisco that the Chinamen "remanded" by the Federal Judges do not go back to China at all. They simply walk out of the back door and walk leisurely up to Chinatown.

Democratic managers propose to dress a lot of loafers as Chinamen, have them parade in honor of the Republican candidate and deluge the Pacific Coast with pictures of the scene.—N. Y. paper.
