WELL BORING MACHINES.

A Word of Warning to Those About to Invest.
 There is just now considerable excitement in this State over the subject of artesian wells.

As the APPEAL was the first newspaper to advocate this method of securing water, it deems it its duty to say something about well boring machines.

The Eastern market is flooded with alleged, well boring machinery most of which is not worth its weight in old iron.

The descriptive circulars sent out by the manufactures make it appear as if a child could run a well down 100 feet and not half try.

Messrs. McLoughlin & Hawkins sent East for the Ohio well borer. The descriptive catalogue promised all sorts of things of this machine, but when it arrived it was scarcely of any practical use.

It was made of the cheapest possible material and of poor workmanship.

The wearing parts which should have been steel were of cast iron, and after a few trials, the duped owners decided that the machine was almost worthless.

Being skilled mechanics however they did away with a number of parts only made for show and constructed a new machine.

When they got through, all that was left of the original machine was the power and the derrick.

They exactly reversed the manner of handling the debris of the borings and as a result they were soon able to do twice the work with their own contrivance.

Two artesian well companies have already been formed in this State, one in Douglas county and the other in Eureka.

The Douglas company have sent for the Illinois well borer.

The APPEAL hopes it will do all it claims but would not be surprised to see it do a good deal less.

It advertizes to bore from 6 to 600 feet a day. To expect 600 feet a day by any machine is simple nonsense.

Six feet is often nearer the mark although on favorable ground 100 feet may be counted on.

The best place to send for machinery is the Pennsylvania Oil Regions.

Hundreds of practical well boring machines are now lying idle there over abandoned wells which can be secured very cheap.

These machines are made to bore wells and not merely to sell.

They are the most perfect machines ever constructed for the work and the result of years of practical experience.

The APPEAL believes the machines used by McLoughlin & Hawkins, since it was remodeled is an excellent machine, but too small to go 2,000.

Such a machine of a larger pattern and capable of going 2,000 feet could be built at the V. & T. R. E. car shops in this city for much less price than the cost of the Eastern machines.

If however any of the companies now being formed in this State want a practical well borer whose motto is "To h— or bust," they will find the old Pennsylvania borers will fill the bill more completely than any other.

Artesian well boring is likely to become an important industry in this State and it is best to get started right.

Fish for All.
 When this State gets an artesian well in every town 1000 feet deep, that will keep a ten-acre reservoir supplied, these reservoirs can be stocked with trout for public use. There will be fish for all the year round. This would be a perfectly practicable scheme and make a cheap food supply, unless some old fogies bucked at it on the grounds that it would injure the fish business.

JIM BRAZELL'S SCHEME.

A Well Known Mining Expert to Become a Well Borer.

James Brazell, the well known mining expert and prospector, returned from a trip into the wilds of Western Nevada and Inyo county, Cal., this morning. Mr. Brazell is an ardent advocate of artesian wells and grows enthusiastic when talking about his favorite subject. He contends that artesian wells can be bored successfully in any of the valleys of Western Nevada lying contiguous to the Sierra Nevada mountains. He says that he has thoroughly studied the subject, closely observed the topography of the country which he has been over, compared it with regions where the artesian well problem has been solved, and is confident that his assertions can and will be proved in time.

Mr. Brazell is not only a good mining man, but a born speculator as well, and will shortly proceed to San Francisco, where he expects to enlist a number of capitalists in a scheme he has of reclaiming 5000 acres of land near Washoe Lake, which he says needs only water to render it equal to the most productive land on the Coast. This he intends to do by means of artesian wells, and is confident that in the locality named he can strike water at a depth of thirty feet. He means business, and will shortly organize a company, when work will be prosecuted vigorously.—Gazette.
