**WASHINGTON LETTER.**

[From our regular correspondent.]  
 WASHINGTON, Aug., 24, 1888.  
 Senator Davis from the Pension Committee has reported to the Senate a substitute for the bill granting Mrs. General Sheridan a pension of \$5000 a year, which reduces it to \$3500. Could not this wealthy Government well afford to give the widow of "Little Phil" \$5000? The widows of other men who never did one-tenth as much for the United States as Sheridan, have been given \$5000 pensions without an objection.  
 The Chinese bill having passed both houses is now in the hands of the President.  
 When it was stated several days ago that the Treasury surplus for the present fiscal year would be very small, owing to the large appropriations by the present Congress, the Democrats attempted to pooh-pooh the whole thing as a Republican campaign story, but they are now laughing on the wrong side of their faces. Mills, Fairchild and Cleveland have been in consultation over the matter, endeavoring to get up a plan to hide the confusion of the Democrats, who suddenly find themselves in a red hot campaign with their guns spiked and their ammunition—"that awful Treasury surplus"—gone. An official statement has been issued by the Treasury Department showing that the appropriations made and to be made by bills which are sure to pass, amount to \$425,870,514, and the estimated receipts of the Government from all sources is \$440,563,734, which could leave a surplus of \$14,693,220. But an important item was not included in this statement. Although not quite one-sixth of the fiscal year has yet gone by, there is a falling off in the custom receipts of \$3,000,000. If this keeps up for the rest of the fiscal year we would have a deficiency. No wonder the Democrats are perplexed. Their free trade programme has been headed off in an unexpected manner.  
 The Senate Finance Committee are giving hearings to parties interested in the tariff. It is stated that the substitute for the Mills bill will not be reported until about September 15. It is expected by that time to be through with the appropriations and other important legislation, and the Senate can devote its whole time to the tariff bill.  
 The action of the Democrats of the House shows that they do not intend to allow several important pension bills to be considered which have passed the Senate, so some of the Republicans have determined to make the point of "no quorum" against everything brought forward by the Democrats, which will necessitate the return of many Democrats who are absent making stump speeches.  
 Senator Stewart made a personal explanation in reply to the charge made by Com. Stockslager of the General Land Office, that the Senator's amendment to an appropriation bill providing that no part of an item of \$300,000, to prevent timber spoliation, should be used in the investigation of any case, or in the prosecution of any person in the mining regions for cutting (for mining or domestic purposes) scrub timber unfit to be sawed into lumber was in the interests of timber thieves. After showing that this was in the interests of the honest, hard working citizens, Mr. Stewart declared that the office of the Commissioner of the General Land Office had become the synonym of wickedness and oppression, and was bringing reproach on the Government. If such things were to go on, the people of the Western States would know who were their friends.
