THE LAKE EXTORTION.

An Attempted Defense of the Resort

An anonymous correspondent in the Truckee Republican publishes a long defense of the various methods of the Lake in which the following occurs:

The Carson editors have for years acted the part of the dog in the manger concerning Lake Tahoe. Instead of endeavoring to make the public acquainted with the attractions of that locality as a resort, thereby inducing travel and indirectly benefitting their own town, they are to the contrary publishing accounts of extortion that never occurred, of partiality that never was shown, of an unaccommodating spirit, towards the public, that exists only in their own imagination, unless the objections of Lake people, on one or two occasions to furnish these editors with free board and transportation during some of their visits, can be denominated as such, and thus by the most contemptible exaggeration deterring travel by endeavoring to lead people to believe that to visit Lake Tahoe necessitates their associating with a band of cutthroats. In spite of the unsavory reputation thus given Tahoe, that place is growing in popularity as evidenced by the yearly increase in travel and by the fact that the same families return season after season.

In the above an admission is inadvertently made which proves our case. Families return year after year because the landlord takes special pains to make them comfortable but the ordinary transit tourist is treated like an outside barbarian.

People of small means should get just as much attention at Tahoe for ten dollars as millionaires, but they do not.

The Carson papers were the first to proclaim the beauties of Tahoe to the World.

The APPEAL has not published one tenth of the complaints of the Lake that has reached this office.

The syndicate which has been running the Lake for years have had such immunity from newspaper criticism that they imperiously resent any telling of the truth regarding them.

The APPEAL proposes to tell the truth nevertheless, and if the anonymous correspondent will come out over his own signature, we will debate the question to his heart's content.

The remark about an objection to furnish Carson editors with free board and transportation is hardly worth replying to.

The APPEAL will give \$100 to any hotel keeper or steamboat captain who will assert and prove it, that the editor of this paper ever asked him for free board or free transportation.

The APPEAL has always dealt with the resorts of the Lake on a strictly business basis.

On one occasion the editor of the APPEAL tendered a Tahoe hotel keeper 50 cents for a lunch and the coin was pushed back with the remark:

"Oh! keep the money and give me a send off."

The reply was: "If I do not pay for that meal now, you will always think I owe it. If you wish a description of your place in the APPEAL it will be \$25 a column. How much do you want?" The landlord took the money but did not want to advertise.

The landlord expected a cold ham and potatoe lunch to be legal tender for \$25 worth of advertising and that is just where the shoe pinches some of the Tahoe landlord.

If there is a dollar due from the APPEAL to any landlord or boat captain at Lake Tahoe this office will pay just double the face of all legitimate bills presented.

A Novel Idea.

Dr. Kirby, of Emerald Bay, was in the city yesterday. The Doctor is a live hotel proprietor and will introduce some novelties next season at his place that will astonish the natives. He is figuring on an elevator 800 feet high to take visitors to the top of the big rock, and the same will be run by water power. He will also have fountains and electric lights.

WATER FOR CARSON.

A Plan to Give Us Decent Sewerage.

Carson is just now suffering from a scarcity of water. The sewers have not been flushed out for weeks because of that scarcity, and the grass is dying in the Capital square.

Carson has never yet had an adequate water supply. The truth is that for years past the city has suffered from epidemics of scarlet fever and typhoid fever, due to imperfect sewerage.

A few miles back of this city, in the canyon, is a natural reservoir. All it needs is about \$1000 expended in damming its outlet to make it a reservoir capable of impounding five times the amount of water now used in this city, and enable ranchers in the vicinity to use all they need beside.

This natural reservoir has been lying within half an hour's ride of this city for years, and yet no advantage has been taken of it. If such a storage reservoir were in operation now, the foul smells which now infest this city would be unknown, and there would not be numbers of people scattered about the place on their backs with typhoid fever.

It is time for Carson to wake up and do something for itself. There is water enough on the hills and running to waste to enable Carson to have a fountain in each yard.

If the city grows, as it will, the present water supply will only be sufficient for drinking purposes.

The place mentioned as a storage reservoir is well known to a hundred in this city, and it is high enough to give a heavy pressure in case of fires.

Enough buildings have burned up here in the last few years through lack of water pressure to build the reservoir several times over.

The Flyers Arrive.

John Sweeny, Carson's well-known turfman, arrived today with his string of fleet-footed racers, on which the average Capitolian invariably places his last cent whenever the opportunity offers. The animals are well known in turf circles, and comprise the following: Pat Reddy, a three-year-old Gibraltar trotter; Dick Kelly, a three-year Gibraltar pacer, Hattie S., a trotter which won three races at the last State Fair; Sam Lewis, the celebrated pacer, Starlight, a four-year old Norfolk runner, Gibber, a two-year-old trotter with a record of 2:24 on the Carson track, Lookout, a phenomenal runner, William P., a trotter whose sire has given the turf a long list of fleet-footed progeny, and three colts. Nearly all the horses mentioned are entered for the races during Fair week, and their owner confidently expects to more than divide honors with the visiting horseman.—Gazette.

Mason Valley Solid.

Old Man Baird, who runs a ranch in Mason Valley four miles from the Switch, was in town yesterday, making purchases and arranging for sales in his line of goods. He says hay will be hay this year.
