THE MONEY UP.

Republicans Deposit \$5,000 on Harrison.
Yesterday afternoon Dr. Lee, Sam Wright and Frank McCullough called at Wells Fargo and deposited \$5,000 on Harrison, to be covered by the same amount of Democratic money on Cleveland.

The Agreement.

All the candidates now in the field (except those who were absent from the city) have signed the following, which was passed at a candidates' meeting.

Resolved, That the names of all the candidates for the different county and township offices be voted for at the Republican Primaries to be held in Carson City, Nevada, on the 22nd day of September, 1888, be placed upon one ticket, and that each candidate pledge himself in writing to put no other ticket in the field, nor to allow any other ticket to be placed in the field in their behalf, and we, the undersigned candidates hereby pledge ourselves to place no other ticket in the field, nor to allow anyone to place a ticket in the field in our behalf, and we do further agree that in case any other ticket should appear other than the one here agreed upon, we will do all in our power and use our every endeavor to defeat the party in whose interest said ticket has been placed in the field.

A FAIR FIELD.

On Saturday night the gentlemen who are candidates for county offices at the ensuing election, met at the District Courtroom and passed a resolution to the effect that the names of all the candidates should be placed on one ticket, to be voted for at the Crawford primaries. The gentlemen voting were all the candidates who have so far proclaimed themselves for county offices, either being there personally or represented by authorized proxy.

They were as follows: Messrs. Coffin, Torreyson, Folsom, McLoughlin, Bray, Summerfield, Doane, Tobriner, McCabe, Ullrick, Roberts, Harford, Hawthorne, Dobbs, Witherell, Thaxter and Davis. Evan Williams sent a proxy who voted for the resolution.

This is the first time in the history of politics that there has been so amicable a feeling in Ormsby county, when all candidates were willing to pledge themselves to go on the same ticket and allow the people to exercise an absolutely free choice.

This plan does away entirely with slates and combinations, of all descriptions. A man nominated by so fair a plan as this can feel absolutely certain that he is the choice of the majority of the voters of the party, and the man who is defeated cannot with good grace grumble over the result and ascribe his defeat to political trickery.

It is the fairest primary ever presented to the people of Ormsby, and they can select their county officers and representatives with perfect freedom from one end of the ticket to the other.

Water Reservoirs.

The S. F. Call has the following on water storage:

Our telegraphic report notices the section of the Sundry Civil Bill which provides for an exploration of the mountain ranges for water reservoirs, which is by far the most important section in the bill, and perhaps the most important matter now before Congress.

The water supply on which the fertility of the United States depends is being gradually exhausted. The rivers are growing shallower every year, or drying up. In this State the disease may be studied in an advanced stage; in the central valleys it is seen in a preliminary stage. But it makes rapid progress. Within the memory of men now living vessels of considerable size navigated rivers in this and other States which are now muddy and shallow streams.

The remedy is the one which was adopted in the arid countries of the Old World. We must store our water and save it from flowing into the sea. And we cannot afford to build reservoirs of brick and stone, for they would cost too much. We must avail ourselves of the reservoirs created by nature and left behind when the surplus water flowed off—the old lake basins. These are to be found in every mountain range, and could be made available at small expense by damming up the outlet through which the water escaped. The new section of the Sundry Civil Bill appropriates a sum of money to defray the costs of looking out for such basins; after explanations it passed without debate. The people of this State would be glad to hear that the explorers were already at work in the Sierra.

Needless Defence.

The way the Sacramento Record Union rushes to the defence of the virtue of Sacramento ladies is very ludicrous.

The San Francisco papers stated that Sacramento was overrun with fast women at the Fair.

This was strictly true as thousands could testify who were there.

The Record-Union waxes indignant and assumes that this statement reflects on the character of all the women of Sacramento. The Record-Union should remember that only fast women were alluded to and the respectable ladies of the city who are being so vigorously defended by the Record-Union will hardly thank that paper for its gratuitous work in their behalf.
