Carson at the Fair.

All Carson turned out to patronize the Reno Fair on Wednesday and it resulted in the biggest attendance ever known at a State Fair in Nevada.

Pursuant to Special Order No. 3, issued by order of the Commander-in-Chief of the Nevada National Guard by Acting Adjutant General Galusha, directing the First Brigade N. N. G., to report at Reno on the 19th instant for parade, inspection, review and target practice, Co. A (Nationals) 56 men, Captain H. J. Gosse, commanding, Co. B (Emmet Guard) 56 men, Captain P. J. Danne, commanding, both of Virginia, and the Carson Guard, 47 men, Captain George C. Hark, commanding, arrived there on Wednesday morning at 11 o'clock by special train. They were received at the depot by Co. C (Reno Guard), Captain R. H. Lindsay, commanding, and a large crowd of civilians. Governor Stevenson and staff and General R. P. Keating and staff, General N. P. Jaques and staff were also present, all fully equipped and mounted, with the exception of Governor Stevenson, who was dressed in civilian clothes. A beautiful lunch had been prepared by the Depot hotel for the expected guests and while they were enjoying it in detachments the Winnemucca band and Reno bands alternately rendered enlivening musical selections. Luncheon finished, the companies marched to the Fair grounds, where they proceeded to accomplish the object of their visit. The distance was 200 yards Springfield Military rifles, 6-pound pull, no sighting allowed. The scores were as follows:
