ORDINANCE NO. 77.

An Ordinance in Relation to Licenses in Carson City, Nevada.

The Board of Trustees of Carson City do ordain:

Section 1.—Every person, firm or association, engaged in selling at auction, dry-goods, wares or merchandise within the Corporate-limits of Carson City, Nevada, shall pay for and obtain a license so to do, and shall pay therefore, if by the day, Twenty-five dollars (\$25.) if by the quarter, Two-hundred and fifty dollars (\$250.)

Section 2. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not exceeding one hundred dollars (\$100) or imprisonment in the County Jail fifty days or by both such fine or imprisonment.

Section 3. This Ordinance is intended to repeal Ordinance No. 68, heretofore passed by the Board of Trustees of Carson City, Nevada, and all other Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict with this Ordinance.
