

THE CARPET-BAGGERS.

The Eureka Sentinel says: The Carson papers announce that eight bricklayers recently arrived from the East to work on the Public Building at Carson. This is the old story and we are getting tired of it. Nevada employment should be given to Nevada people. All over the State young ladies are imported from the East to teach our public schools, to the exclusion of Nevada raised girls who as a rule are much brighter and in every way better qualified than their Eastern sisters. The press of the State should hound every man who encourages carpet-bagism of any sort. We can make the practice odious and that will kill it. The Administration is not to blame for the bringing out of the above bricklayers. The building is being built under contract. The contractor employs whom he pleases. He came out from the East himself, wearing a Harrison and Morton badge.

The Sentinel, while correct in the main, misunderstands the proposition of the bricklayers. They are layers of ornamental pressed brick, and could not be found in this State. Those of California were all employed, and the sending East was a necessity.

The Sentinel is dead right on the general proposition that Nevada raised men and women are good enough for this country. The APPEAL hopes to see the time come when a candidate for public office will be buried out of sight if it can be clearly proven that he sends out of the State to buy goods which he could get in Nevada.

What's the matter with starting a "Home Protection" party, and down everybody who is too stingy to patronize his own State?

The Assessors.

Some of the leading attorneys in the State, including W. E. F. Deal, believe that the part of the law making the office of Assessor a four-year term will not hold. The Supreme Court, it will be remembered, decided that part of the bill that placed an Assessor then holding office in the position for four years unconstitutional; that is, the decision is to the effect that the Legislature could not extend the term of any office-holder in office before the bill was passed. Attorney General Alexander gives it as his opinion that Assessors elected after the bill became a law should hold the office for four years. However, a fight will be made by the Assessors elected in many of the counties, on the 6th of November, to have the matter decided by the Supreme Court. Ben Fitch was the one elected in Elko county.

A Novel Election Bet.

A novel election bet was made recently at Eckstein's saloon at Delaney and Clinton streets, New York, between two wealthy builders, George Feh, an Irishman, and John Ruff, a German. If Cleveland was elected the Irishman was to take the German to Berlin on a two-months' trip, and pay all his expenses, including especially all the beer the German could drink. In the event of Harrison's election the German was to take the Irishman on a two-months' trip to Ireland pay all his expenses including three bottles of Irish whiskey every day. A forfeit was put up and the men will sail for Europe in about a week.

The editor of the Santa Cruz Sentinel whose recent political defeat was chronicled in the columns of the Times shortly after its occurrence, thus moralized to his consoling friends:

ORDINANCE NO. 77.

An Ordinance in Relation to Licenses in Carson City, Nevada.

The Board of Trustees of Carson City do ordain:

Section 1.—Every person, firm or association, engaged in selling at auction, dry goods, wares or merchandise within the Corporate Limits of Carson City, Nevada, shall pay for and obtain a license so to do, and shall pay therefore, if by the day, Twenty-five dollars (\$25), if by the quarter, Two-hundred and fifty dollars (\$250.)

Section 2.—Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not exceeding One hundred dollars (\$100) or imprisonment in the County Jail fifty days or by both such fine or imprisonment.

Section 3.—This Ordinance is intended to repeal Ordinance No. 69, heretofore passed by the Board of Trustees of Carson City, Nevada, and all other Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict with this Ordinance.
