

A CORRECTION.

Sunday's issue of the Examiner, in giving a sketch of the life of John C. Heenan, has the following:

"John's only California fight took place at Vallejo at a picnic. His opponent was Matt Cannavan, a politician of this State and Nevada. He tried to get the nomination for Governor of Nevada on the Democratic ticket, but was defeated by Adams.


