A CHANGE OF KEY. During the campaign, the Democratic papers of California were harping day and night, on the evils of Chinese labor, and called upon the people to vote the Democratic ticket en masse, because Cleveland was a Chinese exclusionist.

Mr. Joseph Goodman, of Fresno, a raisin-raiser and man of deep, broad judgment, comes out squarely in an interview and says that the exclusion of Chinese from California will ruin the raisin and grape industry and check the boom the State is now experiencing.

Mr. Goodman says that white men are not willing to starve ten months in the year in order to work two, and the Chinese are. On his ranch, six men are all he needs for ten months, and then comes the grape-curing season and he needs sixty.

The thinning out of the Chinese has caused a scarcity of labor and a raise in the rates of wages, so that the Chinese are in a fair way of demanding \$2 a day next Fall, and \$2.50 the Fall after.

The moral of this whole thing is that the Chinese are necessary to California for the work which white men will not do, and in picking grapes and curing raisins with the thermometer at 109 in the shade, they are not competing with white labor.

Mr. Goodman asserts, and we are not disposed to gainsay it, that a square vote taken in California today on the Chinese exclusion question would result in the defeat of the proposition by a large majority.

THE WELLS, FARGO ROBBERY.

The recent robbery of the Wells Fargo car near Clipper Gap has been the talk of the Coast since the occurrence.

Here and there one hears men dwelling on the cowardice of the messengers on the car.

There seems to be an impression with a good many that when a couple of masked men jump aboard a car and cover the messengers with revolvers that said messengers ought to at once engage in a desperate-hand-to-hand encounter with the robbers and die in the attempt to defend the property of their employers.

All this would be very heroic, but also, very foolish. The Wells, Fargo Company is very notorious as a monopoly that stints its employees and has never been notorious for rewarding acts of bravery on the part of persons who work for it.

A man in Elko county in the employ of the company was ruined for life in a fight with robbers and all he ever got was a toy pistol from the Company and his doctor bill is still unpaid.

With such rewards for meritorious service men cannot be expected to lay down their lives in defense of the company's money.

The Company could easily provide its cars with safes and time locks and also fasten the doors so that it would be impossible to board a train.

As it does not see fit to go to this expense its losses by robberies do not gain it much sympathy with the public.
