

AGAINST SILVER COINAGE.

Honest John Sherman presented a petition in the Senate from the Board of Trade of New York against the purchase of silver bullion and coinage of silver dollars. Why Sherman was selected to represent Wall street, when New York has two members in the Senate, can only be surmised. To him, who has been the unrelenting enemy of silver, the task was doubtless a pleasure. Though nominally Senator from a Western State, whose Representatives in the popular branch of Congress have been almost unanimous in favor of silver remonetization, Sherman is thoroughly imbued with Wall Street ideas, and lets no opportunity pass to score a point against the legislatively debased metal. He predicted when the Standard Dollar Act was passed over the veto of eight-to-seven Hayes, that it would demoralize commerce, drive gold out of the country, and play the mischief with the financial affairs of the country, and though, as a financial prophet, he has been as dismal a failure as Wiggins has proved as a weather prophet, yet, like the cranky Canadian, he persists in telling the public what he does not know, and by his Wall Street admirers is held up as the greatest financier of the age, simply and solely because he is opposed to silver. In this opposition, however, he is seconded by nearly all the politicians who claim to be the champions of American industry, yet with the inconsistency peculiar to political tricksters, endeavor by every means in their power to kill the silver mining industry, which they succeeded, by deception, in badly crippling in 1873.—Silver State.

DIMMIG'S ACQUITTAL.

The conclusion of the trial of Dimmig, the San Francisco book agent, on the charge of murder makes one of the most sensational and complicated criminal cases ever known in the annals of court practice in the United States.

It was the off-shoot of the killing of Mrs. Milton Bowers, and while Dimmig was finally acquitted by a jury the public will always believe that the man was the tool of Dr. Bowers and if not the principal one of the accessories of Benhayon's mysterious death.

Everyone believes that Benhayon met his death by foul means and that a confession was forged to cover the track of murder and save the neck of Bowers who is a man of the most extraordinary fertility of invention and exhaustless resources.

We believe that if the sleepy authorities of the jail had kept Mrs. Zensing away from Bowers and kept the proper watch that the clever conspiracy which resulted in Benhayon's death would never have been committed.

There is scarcely the shadow of a doubt regarding the murder of poor Benhayon, but the work was done with such consummate skill that the best detectives were baffled when they sought the truth.

The wires intimate possibilities of a special session of Congress. There certainly should be. Aside from the matter of organizing the House, there is plenty of business on hand which should be attended to. The tariff is one thing; the silver business is another, and most of all the waiting Territories should receive attention. The Salt Lake Tribune says: To keep such a region as Dakota, Montana or Washington, peopled as they all are, under the vassalage of a territorial form of government is an outrage which should be cured on the very first opportunity. The deputies in Congressional elections should be determined at the very earliest moment, while the facts are fresh. It looks to us as though a special session was not only probable, but absolutely essential.

Unmasking will begin at 11 o'clock, when those holding tickets to the stage will be permitted to dance.


No tickets will be sold to maskers at the door. Spectators holding spectators' tickets will be permitted on the floor until the maskers leave the stage.
