

Not Anti-Chinese.

The Examiner tells the following: There is a quite family hotel in this city of the genteler sort, which is largely frequented by Eastern tourists and others of Eastern antecedents. The Chinese lottery craze has struck this hotel and its inmates and is making fearful inroads upon the pockets of the victims.

The Chinese lottery seems to have a peculiar fascination for the Eastern mind. It is very simple, it is not a bit like gambling, and it costs so little to get into the game. A 10-cent ticket is so trifling and the possibility of winning \$18 75 on a seven spot so very alluring. And so at this hotel, the proprietor, his clerks and all his guests, men, women and children, anxiously await twice a day the coming of the Celestial lottery agent.

In fact, there are two or three agents, for the heathens have awakened in their opportunity, and it is safe to say that a livelier business is done in that house than any similar place in town. It is great fun to drop into the hotel about 11 o'clock at night, when the evening drawings come in.

The ladies are almost breathless with excitement and suppressed emotion. The proprietor and his clerks count the spots and compare the drawings, and carefully keep each lady's book separate. When all are compared each book has on it the sum won, if anything, and it is sent to the lady's room.

Children's tickets are treated in the same way. Those who may have won rush to tell their neighbors and mark a new book for the next day's drawing. The afternoon drawing is reported about five o'clock, and the same scenes are enacted.

It is rare amusement for an outsider to watch the greed of these Eastern folks and bear them discuss their luck or want of it. For the past few weeks it is said the Celestial goddess has been quite liberal and that several of the ladies have won seven spots, and one, at least, secured an eight spot, which, resulting in a gain of \$63, nearly turned her head. The devotees of the new fad are perhaps not aware of the ordinance against playing the Chinese lottery, for if they were not one of them would probably risk a \$40 fine by violating it. But what a commotion would be made if the police were able to find out the location of that hotel and make a raid on it.

WHY BLAINE WON'T GET IN.

A Story That Mrs. Harrison Was Once Snubbed by Mrs. Blaine.

St Paul Minn., January 13.—Colonel Bickwell, Quartermaster of Department of Dakota, who was Lord High Chamberlain of the Garfield Administration, said tonight that Blaine would certainly not get a place in the Harrison Cabinet. "I know precisely what I am talking about when I say this," said the Colonel. "There are a couple of women in the case, and they are no less distinguished women than Mrs. Blaine and Mrs. Harrison. Why, when Blaine was Secretary of State I was present at a reception given by Mrs. Blaine, at which the latter snubbed Mrs. Harrison, and that settles it. Harrison will no doubt offer Blaine a foreign ministry, but Mrs. Harrison will see that he is not in the Cabinet."
