ORDINANCE NO. 78.

An Ordinance to Regulate Licenses in Carson City.

The Board of Trustees of Carson City do ordain:

Section 1-Section 22 of Ordinance 22 entitled, An Ordinance to regulate business in Carson City is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 21-Every person, firm or association engaged in carrying on the business of keeping a bowling alley, saloon, laundry, livery stable, hay yard and butchers, gas companies, electric light companies, water companies, saddlers, brewers, forwarding merchants, keepers of plating mills, wood dealers and insurance agents or in the business of keeping any sheds, corral or other place where animals are boarded, hired or sold or where feed is sold, or in the manufacture of any acid, base, stone, soap or cigars, shall pay for and obtain quarterly, a license to carry on such business and shall pay therefore ten dollars per quarter.

SEVENTEENTH DAY.

SENATE.

Prayer by Rev. T. R. Sanford. President Davis in the chair. Leave of absence granted Torre and Kaiser.

The Ways and Means Com. reported back A. B. to repeal an Act requiring publication of partnership, without recommendation.

The real purport of the Bill was fully explained by Williams, Comins and LaGrave, and was unanimously beaten.

The Com. on Ways and Means reported adversely Osborne's bill in relation to moneys forfeited to the State of Nevada on land purchases.

The Judiciary Com. reported that all necessary steps relative to submitting the Constitutional Amendments had been taken.

Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 17; relative to printing 1,000 copies of Sharon's election bill. Adopted.

INTRODUCTION AND FIRST READING.

S. B. No. 20; an Act relative to Agricultural Experiment Stations in this State. Referred to Committee on Federal Relations.

Senate Joint and Concurrent Resolution No. 9, by Nicholls; relative to appointing a Committee for the revision of Revenue Laws. Adopted.

GENERAL FILE.

S. B. No. 15; an Act relative to Courts of Justice. Passed 15 to 3. Senate then went into the executive session and took a recess at 1:30 until 2:30 o'clock.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Senate Joint and Concurrent Resolution, No. 12; Relative to amending the Constitution, made special order for Jan. 31, at 2 o'clock P. M.

THIRD READING.

S. B. No. 22; an Act repealing an Act, relative to authorizing commission on Poll Tax and proceeds of mines.

Made special order for Jan 29, at 2 P. M. Adjourned.

ASSEMBLY.

Assembly met at 11 A. M., Speaker pro tem Beck in the chair. Prayer by Rev. A. T. Brady. Journal read and approved.

RESOLUTIONS.

By Springmeyer-Memorial and Joint Resolution requesting Congress to make further appropriation for procuring hydrographic and topographical surveys of the lands of the State. Referred to Committee on Internal Improvements.

By Herman-Relative to accepting invitation of State Board of Agriculture to visit fair grounds. Adopted.

By Beck-Relative to appointing a joint committee, three from each house, to control the Legislative visitors to the town of Reno tomorrow. Adopted.

Beck, Allen of Churchill, and Hanna appointed as such Committee from the House.

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS.

By Wyckoff-A. B. 41, an Act to regulate the salaries of Superintendents of Public Schools. Referred to Committee on Education.

By Murray-A. B. 42, an Act regulating fees, etc., of certain officers. Referred to Judiciary Committee.

A. B. 16-An Act to authorize State Capitol Commissioners to light the Capitol and grounds by electricity.

Allen of Eureka, moved to reduce appropriation from \$1800 to \$1250. Carried.

Cheney moved to strike out section 30 [killing the Bill.] Lost. At 12:30 recess till 2:30.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

A. S. Relative to Electric Light for the State Capitol and grounds. Reports Standing Committees introduced out of order on engrossment and Public Lands.

A message from the Senate, stating that the Committee to make arrangements with Mr. Yerington, reported two coaches provided for \$100 to transport the members of the Legislature and attaches to and from Reno, on Friday. Leave Carson at 9:15 A. M. and return at 5, P. M.

Mr. Hanna moved that A. B. No. 16, be taken from the table and

made special order for Tuesday at 2 P. M.

A. B. No. 37. By Moore, fixing the salaries of the officers of Nye Co. Amendments adopted and ordered reengrossed.

A. B. No. 26. By Langan, to define the term "Reasonable doubt" in law. Substitute placed on final passage and carried.

A. B. No. 29. By McQuitty. Relative to the boring of artesian wells in this State, after long and animated discussion made special order for Tuesday next at 11 A. M.

A. B. No. 17. To select 40,000 acres of school lands for Washoe Co. Laid on the table. Adjourned at 3:45, to Monday.

CARSON WINS.

Brannan Messagerizes Elliott in Two Rounds.

Last night's fight between Matt Brannan of this city and "Jolly Elliott" the champion bruiser of Reno resulted in a victory for Carson in the second round. The audience began to fill the place by 10 o'clock and the Carson Band discoursed a few bars of sacred music to soothe the feelings of the audience.

As most of the Legislature were at the gubernatorial reception, Cincaid and Musgrove were sent into the ring to fill in the time until the solons could get down. About quarter of eleven the members and attaches came down in a body and then the principles were sent into the hempen square.

Brannan won the toss for corners and took the upper corner. He was seconded by Cincaid and Musgrove, while two Renotes performed the nurse act for Elliott, who from the fact that their man lost the fight, desire that their names be kept out of print. Chas Coburn of Virginia City acted as referee.

Brannan was in fine form, with bunches behind his shoulders which hinted at good driving powers.

Elliott was trained for a longer fight and was lighter all over.

FIRST ROUND.

At the call of time the two men came to the center and Elliott began dancing about his man to take a general measure making numerous feints and introducing several airy movements to disconcert his opponent. In one of these gyrations he came within range and got a warm call from Brannan's left in the ribs just a little too high for the mark.

A round of applause came from the Carson contingent, and Brannan was back in position in time to avoid the counter.

Brannan led again with his left and delivered in the others face, and while the dance went on, he sent in a rib-roaster with his right as the round ended and a howl went up from all over the house.

Brannan went to his corner with a confident air and Cincaid remarked as he fanned him with a Turkish towel:

"Wish I could pick up money as easy as that. Give it to him left and right, open for his stomach and then lead for his head."

SECOND ROUND.

Brannan danced to the front and opened the ball at once. Elliott led, but fell short, and Brannan working him into his corner, rushed in like a flash and landed with his left in the stomach; a blow that sounded all over the house. Elliott reeled back, and Brannan shot his right in on his left eye, and Elliott sank in his corner, a beaten man.

His seconds worked hard to bring him too, but the watch ticked out the ten seconds, Cincaid claimed the fight for his man, and the sponge went up.

The blow in the stomach had done its work, and the blood was streaming from the cut over the eye.

In about ten minutes Brannan offered to continue the fight and let the knock-out go, but Elliott was completely gone, and went to his dressing room.
