ORDINANCE NO. 78.

An Ordinance to Regulate Licenses in Carson City.

The Board of Trustees of Carson City do ordain:

Section 1-Section 22 of Ordinance 53 entitled, An Ordinance to regulate business in Carson City is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 21-Every person, firm or association engaged in carrying on the business of keeping a boarding place, saloon, laundry, livery stable, hay yard and butchers, gas companies, electric light companies, water companies, saloons, brewers, forwarding merchants keepers of places for mules, wood dealers and insurance agents or in the business of keeping any sheds, corral or other place where animals are boarded, hired or sold or where feed is sold, or in the manufacture of any acid, blue stone, soap or cigars, shall pay for and obtain quarterly a license to carry on such business and shall pay therefore ten dollars per quarter.

STATE AND COUNTY GOVERNMENT.

Views on the Same by E. C. Hardy.

EDITOR OF CARSON APPEAL:—As some representatives of Elko and White Pine counties have asked me to suggest a more simple, less expensive and more convenient form of Government for our State, please permit me to make the suggestion through your paper at the Capital. I would begin by reducing the Governor's salary, and would reduce salaries of State officers as low as would be paid for like valuable services by a good business firm. Regarding the Supreme Court, I would, (as has been before suggested) constitute our Supreme Court from four District Judges.

I would have the Legislative department convene on the second Monday in January, and hold a term of four weeks. I would have the Secretary of State cause to be printed, in pamphlet form the Constitution of the United States and the State of Nevada, and furnish each Senator and Representative upon the convening of each Legislature with a copy.

I would have County Judge be ex-officio Clerk of County Court. I would have a County Judge with Concurrent Jurisdiction with District Court in Civil actions where amount sued for did not exceed, say \$800 and give him criminal jurisdiction of misdemeanors. I would have him be Judge of the probate business, and for the aforesaid business, I would have him paid by fee of all cases coming before his court. As we are now situated we must postpone probate business, awaiting the arrival of a District Judge at the County Seat to the great disadvantage of deceased estates.

I would also have the County Judge be Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners, that the said Commissioners might be guided by legal talent and practicable decorum. I would have said Judge paid a per diem service as County Commissioner.

I would have seven other County Commissioners elected in counties having over a certain value of assessable property, and two Commissioners in counties with a lesser assessed value of property, they also to be paid for each day, while going to and from the County Seat and in discharge of the duties of their office and mileage. Plenty of good men will fill this office for the advantages they hope to have from an economical management of County affairs. I would have the County Judge as Chairman of the Board bear and determine all cases of applicants for county aid, and give him power, if necessary to take testimony to determine the case, and if found practicable to make applicants earn part of their living. This should always be the work of one man to save the expenses of the time of the Board and Clerk of Board.

I would have the Sheriff or deputy attend Commissioners' Court and get a day's pay and fees for services performed, if any.

I would make a fee office of the District Attorneyship. The County School Superintendent I would make a salaried office, and would allow said School Superintendent to hold any other county office except Treasurer, so as to allow sparsely populated counties or others to select the most fitting man for that position, although he might be a candidate for another more lucrative office.

I would make a very large cut in the salary of Treasurer. I find in every County Seat, a good business man, who if he were selected would give the best of bonds and fill the office for less than half what is now given.

The county Assessor will also bear more economy in price of salary. County Clerk and County Auditor, both should be paid by fee and in all sparsely populated counties should be filled by one man.

The Sheriff who holds the most important of all offices except the District Judge should be paid by a fee. A tax-payer who wants his property protected is placed at great disadvantage when he applies to a Sheriff who is limited to a salary. This officer should be well paid for fol-

lowing and arresting criminals, and he and the Constables should have the advantage of all rewards that are now given to detectives; this would be an incentive to action of several men instead of one or two persons and thus be a greater protection to life or property. This change should be made or the important office be abolished and the present limited duties be filled by a Town Constable. To give reasons for all these changes would make my already lengthy suggestions too long for the time I have to spare and the room the paper may have for the subject. I clearly understand this policy will be criticised and hope it may lead someone to suggest something better.

But I will say here that I am familiar with this system of county government, and know it to be convenient, effectual, and economical. It takes away all the surplus of large salaries and there is no corruption found to ruin conventions and elections, hence the people select more fitting men who take the offices given them for the actual pay that is in them, and the interest it is to them to serve.

Some may think thirty days time to short for our legislature, but my experience is, we make too many foolish, unconstitutional, and conflicting laws. If a few good laws are needed by the changes of time, they can just as well be formulated in thirty days as to consume 365 days. Many think to consolidate counties to lessen expenses, but this method is bad, it places our citizens at too much inconvenience. We want a different or amended Constitution to fit our peculiar State. It is lamentable to travel in White Pine, Nye and Lincoln counties and witness the burden of taxation wholly unnecessary, and useless to the people. I have seen better county government maintained in Washington Territory for six mills on the dollar. Of course Territorial expenses are lighter but Nevada's system is the most extravagant, and now the most inconvenient of all governments, and our jury system lacks very much of meeting the requirements. Land Decisions.

W. D. Harlan Land and Mining Attorney, Washington D. C., has furnished us the following synopsis of decisions of the Land Dept: In case of W. H. Martin decided by Hon Asst. Secy. Muldrow, it was held that when party failed to establish residence within six months from date of original entry by circumstances beyond his control and good faith is shown by entryman, the entry may be submitted to the board of Equitable adjudication. In Limon Karpes case, Asst. Secy. Muldrow decided that where the entryman's only excuse for not making proof on the day advertised is the unexplained fact that he could not obtain money wherein to make payment, the delay cannot be properly said to occur through no fault of the claimant. New proof will be required, and should the entryman refuse or neglect to make same in time fixed, opportunity will be allowed transfers to prove that the law had been complied with prior to transfer.

A Mild Winter Looked For.
