The Ruby Valley Case.

Thomas O'Connor, the man found with his throat cut last Friday night, was brought down last Friday evening and placed in the Hospital. From Dr. Meigs, who visited him this morning, we learn that his injuries are very severe, and while there is a bare possibility that he may survive, his chances are slim. Both the trachea and esophagus are severed and it is doubtful whether sufficient nourishment can be taken into the stomach to preserve life. Dr. Meigs repaired the wound as far as his power, and he is able to speak a little, but he was cautioned by the physician to refrain all attempts to talk, as such efforts would aggravate the wound. From Ed Kelly, who came down from Hallock this morning, we learn that O'Connor now says, he cut his own throat, but even if he does say so, it will be difficult to believe him after making the statement that he did on Friday night and swearing to it, when there was little doubt that he supposed he had but a few hours to live.—Independent.

"It seems to be the general sentiment that the Constitutional Amendments, relative to a State Lottery, should be unanimously voted for at the coming election, for the reason that in every town and city of Nevada, thousands of dollars are monthly sent out of the State to enrich lottery speculation in New Orleans; when by all rights the money ought to and could be kept here. Every business man and taxpayer should vote for the proposed amendment and give us a lottery of our own."—Tribune Sept. 6, 1888.

—TWENTY-FOURTH DAY.

SENATE.

Williams in the Chair.
Prayer by Rev. Woods.
In compliance with a resolution of the Senate, Surveyor General Jones sent in a report of the amount of monies paid into the State Land office prior to Jan. 1, 1881. Referred to Committee on Ways and Means.

Also a communication from Controller Hallock, relative to money received from the General School Fund, on land sold prior to Jan. 1, 1881. Referred to Committee on Education.

Messrs. Nicholls, Noteware and LeGrave were appointed as the Senate representatives, on the Committee to revise the Revenue laws.

INTRODUCTION AND FIRST READING.

S. B. No. 37; by Noteware—An Act to apportion certain monies collected on different payments on public lands. Referred to Committee on Education.

S. B. No. 38; by Danlop—A bill for the relief of Company A., National Guard.

Referred to the Committee on Claims.

S. B. No. 39; by Sproule—An Act relative to swine and goats. Referred to Committee on County Boundaries.

A. B. No. 6; relative to consolidation of county officers. Referred to Eureka County Delegation.

Mr. Millett moved to reconsider vote on which A. B. No. 26 was lost. Carried.

Mr. LaGrave moved to reconsider vote by which A. B. No. 6 was lost. Lost.

GENERAL FILE.

S. B. No. 28; relative to Public Schools. Amended and ordered engrossed.

S. B. 29; agricultural experiment station. Passed. Nays none.

Substitute for A. B. 26; an Act to define "Reasonable Doubt." Carried, 14 to 4.

S. B. 40, by Millett; an Act to aid the Agricultural Districts of the State. Referred to Com. on Agriculture.

Senate Memorial No. 10, by Gallagher; Memorial to Congress for hydrographic surveys. Referred to Com. on Federal Relations.

Senate Memorial No. 5, relative to State land; amended and passed. Adjourned.

ASSEMBLY.

Assembly met at 11 A. M., Speaker Coffin in the chair.

Prayer by Rev. Mr. Davis.
Journal read and approved.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

By Poujade—That a committee of three be appointed to revise the rules of the Assembly if necessary. Carried.

Messrs. Poujade, Hanna and Beck appointed and Speaker added.

By Thompson—Joint Resolution relative to printing the laws of the fourth session of the Nevada Legislature. Referred to Ways and Means.

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS.

By Nelson—A. B. 57, an Act to prohibit the selling or giving away of spirituous or malt liquor. [Make Indians competent witnesses.] Referred to Judiciary Committee.

By Poujade—A. B. 58, an Act to refund to commercial travellers unused public money received by the State for licences. Referred to Committee on Claims.

S. B. 5—An Act to repeal an Act to provide for the destruction of noxious animals. Referred to Committee on Agriculture.

S. B. 27—An Act for the relief of Company B of first National Guards. [Calls for \$300]. Referred to Committee on Claims.

GENERAL FILE.

A. B. 2—An Act relating to Constitutional Amendments. Read third time and passed.

A. B. 45—An Act to provide for pleasure of persons attending public places of amusement. Read third time and passed, 26 to 13.

A. B. 16—An Act to provide for lighting the Capitol building and

grounds by electricity. Read third time and lost.

Mr. Garrard gave notice that he would move for a reconsideration tomorrow.

S. B. 20—An Act to amend an Act to regulate proceedings in civil cases in Courts of Justice of the [State. Extends time of issuing execution or judgment from 5 to 6 years]. Passed.

Assembly Joint Memorial and Resolution No. 13, relative to sinking artesian wells and the improvement of arable land in the State. Read third time and passed.

At 12 o'clock recess till 1:30 P. M.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

A. B. No. 31; by Blakesley—Tabled on motion by author of bill.

An invitation to attend a temperance meeting in the Methodist Episcopal Church next Sunday was received and a resolution accepting the invitation was adopted.

A. B. 38; by Allen—Reported unfavorably. Indefinitely postponed. Relates to illegitimate children.

A. B. No. 42; relating to fees of witness and jurors. Reported unfavorably.

The bill increases the pay of jurors and provides for the payment of witnesses in all criminal cases before any court. Refused engrossment.

A. B. No. 33; by Coryell—Reported favorably from Committee on Internal Improvements. Create the office of Road Supervisor. County Commissioners are to appoint until next election. Renews the old law. An amendment excluding the counties of Eureka, White Pine, Lyon, Storey, Churchill, Washoe, Lander, Lincoln and Nye, was adopted. For a time the amendments coming in by counties, made it look as though the bill would be amended out of existence, but the stream finally stopped and the bill was ordered engrossed.

SPECIAL ORDER.

Substitute for A. B's No. 7 and 8 was adopted. This is the amendment to the crimes and punishment Act that refers to the age of consent, places the age at 14 years. Passed.

GENERAL FILE.

Memorial and Joint Resolution No. 31; relating to aid from Congress for hydrographic surveys; requests a larger appropriation. Passed.

Assembly Joint Memorial Resolution No. 10, requesting Congress to change lines of Pyramid Reservation to leave Wadsworth out. Passed.

Assembly Joint and Concurrent Resolution, relative to Home Rule in Ireland. Made special order for Friday at 2 o'clock in order to give time to prepare additional resolutions of sympathy with the subjects of the Russian Czar, who are sent to Siberia for political offenses.

S. B. 26, authorizing Commissioners to pay D. T. Worrell \$93 for work done for Commissioners. Passed.

A. B. 25, by Fairbanks, received from the Senate with amendment relating to clerical error. Amendment concurred in by Assembly. Relates to salaries of county officers of Lyon county.

A. B. 7, relating to challenges of jurors; amended by Senate as to number of a section. Amendment adopted.

S. B. 27; for relief of "Co. B," of State National Guard. Considered by Com. of the Whole—reported favorably. Passed. Adjourned.
