ORDINANCE 25.

An Ordinance to Prevent the Spread of Small Pox.

The Board of Trustees of Carson City do ordain:

Sec. 1.—It shall be the duty of the City Marshal, or any policeman under his direction, to put up at the door of any house in said city wherein a patient may be sick of small pox, a yellow flag indicating the presence of said disease immediately upon its being brought to the knowledge of said City Marshal that any person inhabiting such house is sick of the said disease therein.

Sec. 2.—No person shall tear down or remove the yellow flag so put up as aforesaid during the continuance of such disease in such house or houses.

Sec. 3.—It shall be the duty of the City Marshal to give such measures as in his judgment may be necessary for cleaning, fumigating or purifying any building or premises in which any person may have been ill of small pox, and to remove therefrom and destroy the bed and bedding occupied by, and the clothing by such small pox patient, when he may deem it necessary. The expense incurred in carrying out the provisions of this section shall be paid by such small pox patient or his legal representative, and if such person be a married woman or minor, then by the husband, parent or guardian as the case may be.

Sec. 4.—No person attending upon or otherwise coming in contact with any person afflicted with small pox in such a manner or to such an extent as to render him or her liable to communicate the disease shall go upon any public street or in any way mingle with people not afflicted with the disease.

Sec. 5.—No person shall remove a small pox patient from any house or place within the limits of the city to any house or place without a written permission of the City Marshal.

Sec. 6.—No person shall remove from any building or premises any bed or bedding used by; or any clothing worn by any small pox patient while in such service without the permission and direction of the City Marshal.

Sec. 7.—No person shall within the limits of the city burn any bed or bedding used by; or any clothing worn by any small pox patient.

Sec. 8.—It shall be the duty of each physician in this city to report to the City Marshal in writing, every person he shall have sick with small pox immediately after he shall be satisfied of the nature of the disease, and to report to the same officer every case of death from such disease immediately after it shall have occurred.

Sec. 9.—It shall be the duty of every householder in this city to report in writing to the City Marshal; immediately, the name of every person living, boarding or lodging at his or her house, whom he or she shall have reason to believe to be sick of small pox, and any deaths occurring at his or her house from such disease.

Sec. 10.—Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not less than thirty dollars nor more than five hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the county jail, not more than sixty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

THE SMALL-POX.

Is it, or is it Not, in Carson?

All sorts of queer rumors are floating about, relative to the small pox, and from the fact that the disease has not spread, a good many people insist that it is almost anything else than small-pox.

The keeping of the disease within the limits of the Ormsby House, speaks volumes for the prompt action of the authorities, and the excellent quarantine regulations.

Mr. Cowing, the watchman who has been detailed to see that no one enters, or leaves the premises, is a firm believer in the theory that it is black measles, and claims that he has seen one of the patients at the window (Albert) and that he showed no signs of small-pox.

It was also the talk on the street that the whole family were down at breakfast yesterday, which is denied by Dr. Lee, the city physician.

In another column Dr. Lee invites all the physicians of the city to come with him and examine the patients in a body, that the character of the disease may be at once agreed on and established.

His very fair proposition will be found in another column.

The general opinion now is, that the disease was brought to this city in some masquerade costumes brought here from San Francisco, and used at the K. of P. masquerade.

The headquarters of the costumer were at the Ormsby House, and Mr. Kaiser's children all tried on the costumes. The story that a Denver drummer came to the house with it, seems to be without foundation.

At last accounts, there were no fresh cases, and the patients were improving.

A CARD.

As there seems to be some doubt in the mind of the public as to the presence of smallpox in Carson, I ask the medical gentleman of this city to visit the mildest case (that of Albert Johnson) with me that the friends of the various physicians, may know of the existence of this highly contagious and loathsome disease in our midst. Furthermore, if ALL of said physicians will go with me I will promise them not to visit or even to vaccinate a case in private practice so long as this disease obtains. I do this that the public may not be lulled into a fancied security.

Draining Washoe Lake.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE APPEAL:—There is a report that Washoe Lake is to be drained as low as possible and the land put under cultivation or pasture. Last year it was drained four feet, and some of the ranch-men lost valuable tule feed. This year the main stream is prevented from entering the lake by an embankment, and the breeding ground of the perch destroyed. Washoe Lake is something like five by three miles. Four feet of water will irrigate 9600 acres of land. A gate could be put in for a few dollars, which would regulate the drawing off of the water for irrigation, and this will have to be done soon, or there will be a loss of four times the surface of Washoe Lake this year for irrigation, as well as the destruction of game, fish and tule feed.

A rock fill dam, described by the Virginia Enterprise Feb. 3d, will be found very useful to the Nevada farmer when he begins to make his own little dam. A dam could be made in Little Valley for six or eight thousand dollars. I have seen a great many of these dams and they are just the thing for Nevada.

A FRIEND OF NEVADA.

Government Timber.

A Washington dispatch of February 11th, says:

D. L. Bliss, of Carson, Nev., was examined by the sub-committee of the Senate Committee on Mines and Mining to-day. He testifies that if the cutting of scrubby pine timber on the lands of Eastern Nevada was prohibited it would put an end to mining operations there. He swore that the timber was unfit for any other purpose except to be used as firewood, etc., and that a refusal to permit it to be cut would ruin the farmers, as well as miners, inasmuch as the farmers depend upon the miners to buy their produce.

—The taxpayers of California are very much shocked at the startling expose of the rottenness of the prison management at San Quentin. McComb, the warden has an itch for writing letters and his son has similar proclivities. A number of letters which passed between father and son were taken from the old man's desk and published in the newspapers. They show a state of corruption in the management of the Prison, that almost takes a man's breath away. Of course, the first thing done is for the parties implicated to denounce the letters as forgeries and demand a full investigation. If forgeries, however, it seems a little odd that McComb should have moved heaven and earth to get possession of them during the past few months. The friends of the Warden will get together and have an investigation and by excluding all the testimony against the management and admitting everything in favor of it, they will be able to whitewash the old fellow after the most approved style, and he will go on as before, fully vindicated.
