TAKEN TO TASK.

A Resolution Scoring the University Faculty.

The following resolutions passed the Assembly on Tuesday:

WHEREAS, Matters relating to the government of the Military Department of the State University have been brought to the notice of this Assembly, and

WHEREAS, The University is a State institution, in which we, both personally, and as representatives of the people of this State, take much interest and regard with much pride, and

WHEREAS, It appears from the Governor's veto message on Assembly Bill No. 73, and other sources of information, that certain rules and regulations have been made in the Military Department of the University which seem to be more stringent and in closer line with army regulations than the nature of the school demands, therefore be it

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Assembly that the University of the State of Nevada is an institution solely for the aid and benefit of the young men and young women of this State, and the Military Department, while its value as a means of training is not underestimated by this body, is and should be secondary and subservient to the other educational departments; that we believe no rules so stringent or binding should be adopted or enforced as will make it a hardship for any young man or woman to avail themselves of the educational facilities which have been provided for them, and that especial relaxations of restrictions should be made in favor of those who are trying to earn enough money while attending school to meet their expenses of living.

Resolved, That certified copies of these resolutions be sent by the Chief Clerk to the Board of Regents and to the President of the University.

Land Decisions.

W. D. Harlan, Land and Mining Attorney, at Washington, D. C., sends us the following decisions of the Land Department.

In Silas A. Bowe's case, Assistant Commissioner Anderson held that a coal declaratory for lands in Sections 16 and 36, may be allowed without investigation into the character of the land. Investigations by the District officers on their information and belief, into the character of the lands in the declaration, should not be ordered prior to purchase or application to make proof and entry.

Assistant Secretary Muldrow, in Peter Webber's case, decided that where residence shown on final proof is found insufficient, but bad faith is not apparent, the entryman may be permitted to submit communication proof, although the Statutory life of the original entry has expired.

Dan's Opinion of Ranchers.

Dan DeQuille, in a communication to the Salt Lake Tribune, hits the ranchers in the Western part of the State below the belt as follows:

Our people hope for a big fall of snow in March. They say the equinoctial storm will make us all right. Milkmen, ranchers and others are more inclined to trust in the Lord in the matter of a supply of water than in any other. This is doubtless because the other alternative would require them to draw upon their pockets.
