

THE 12 O'CLOCK BILL.

The following is the Early Closing law:

Sec. 1. On and after the first day of April, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, it shall be unlawful for any person or persons, firm or corporation engaged in the business of selling any kind or kinds of spirituous or malt liquors by the glass or drink, or engaged in carrying on or conducting any kind or character of gambling or games of chance, to open such a place of business for the sale of such liquors, or for the prosecution of such games, at an earlier hour than six o'clock in the morning of each or any day, and no such person or persons, firm or corporation shall sell or give away any such liquor or continue to allow the continuance of any such games in or about their respective places of business after the hour of 12 o'clock p. m. of each or any day, and all such places of business, excepting hotels, shall be closed between the hours of midnight and the hour of six o'clock the next morning of each and every day.

Sec. 2. A violation of any of the provisions of this Act shall be deemed a misdemeanor, and upon conviction, the offender shall be punished by a fine of not less than two hundred dollars nor more than five hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the County Jail not less than thirty days nor more than six months, or by both such fine and imprisonment, and persons acting as a servant, employe or agent shall be equally liable with their employers and principals.

Sec. 3. Peace officers are hereby especially required to strictly enforce the provisions of this Act, and a failure on the part of such officer to perform such duty shall render him liable to removal from office as prescribed by law.

Alarmed Boodlers.

There is a panic among the boodlers over the probable passage of Weldon's new extradition bill, which extradites American exiles.

The bill is almost sure to pass. Keenan has canvassed all the American fugitives for a fund of \$100,000 to prevent the passage of the bill or kill the clause including the boodlers now in Canada. The following sums are promised:

Thomas Arworthy, ex-City Treasurer of Cleveland, \$2,000; Moore, the Indianapolis thief, \$1,000; Mrs. Mandelbaum, \$3,000; H. Dickman, \$1,500; Stuckney, the Boston defaulter, \$1,000; Sullivan, ex-County Clerk of Indianapolis, \$4,000; Nelson of Atlanta, Ga., \$1,000.

It is to be hoped that Congress will be decent enough to see that this bill becomes a law in short order.

A Walker Lake Earthquake. Hawthorne claims to have had a shock of half a minute's duration at 4:45 o'clock last Friday morning. The shock was from East to West, as was shown by the water of Walker lake, which was sloped up the bluffs to a height of forty or fifty feet on those sides.
