**ASSEMBLY BILL 135.**

The Silver State and Austin Revell are saying a good deal against Assembly Bill 135, which prevents unlawful heading of stock upon land without the consent of the owner of the land.

The cry has been raised that it was a bill passed in the interests of the cattle men to strike down the sheep industry of Nevada.

We believe that a careful reading of the bill—which for the sake of ready reference is printed in another column—will place the facts in a different light entirely.

The first section provides that "no one shall herd stock on any land in this State without first obtaining the consent of the owner." If there is anything wrong in such a proposition the APPEAL would like to see some of the opponents of the bill explain it. A bill providing that no man could milk another's cows without the owner's consent could not be fairer.

What little talk there is against the bill does not come from recognized sheep men of this State, who own their lands, but from marauding Portuguese from California, who swarm their herds over Nevada lands nine months in the year, and slide back over the Sierra range before the tax collector comes around.

There are also a few sheep raisers in Nevada who run their sheep over their neighbor's lands, owning none of their own, and these few men are turning heaven and earth to induce the Governor not to sign the bill.

It is charged that the bill is drawn up in the interests of the C. P. R. R. Company to keep sheep off their lands. The same papers making this assertion have charged that the C. P. road does not pay its land taxes in Nevada. All right. Let us place these two assertions side by side and see what the bill says. The bill provides that the land included in the province of the bill must have been "assessed and all taxes due therefor have been paid." If the road owes taxes on its land it can take no advantage from the bill until it pays the taxes due on the land.

The bill, should it become a law, would drive all the present, so-called, non-taxpaying sheep owners of California back into their own State, leaving the ranges for Nevada stock, and it would compel the non-land owning sheep men to take up land and pay taxes on it like other people.

It would also compel cattle men who wished to protect their ranges to take up and pay taxes on the land used as a range. In short, the law would cause thousands of acres to be taken up which are now useless to the State being untaxed, and largely increase the revenue of the State.

**AN UNGRATEFUL CITY.**

There is one thing in connection with Ericsson's death that seems to have been overlooked, and that is the part played by John R. Griswold, of New York, in the construction of the Monitor.

Ericsson showed his plans to the Government, but was so coolly received that he went to his friend John R. Griswold, the iron founder. Griswold undertook the construction of the Monitor and pushed it rapidly ahead at his own expense. He fully realized the importance of action, and had it ready in time to reach Hampton Roads and whip the Merrimac. It not only saved the honor of the navy, but it saved the City of New York.

Well, what was the sequel? Griswold ran for Mayor of New York in 1869, and was beaten by Hoffmann. Talk about municipal ingratitude!

The San Francisco Chronicle remarks: General Harrison has not made half so many professions about his unalterable devotion to the cause of civil service reform as Mr. Cleveland did, but he has announced his intention of filling Territorial offices from the Territories themselves, instead of importing carpetbaggers. This is a reform of a genuine sort.
