A PEN PICTURE OF BUCKLEY.

Senator Lynch, of San Francisco, has published a pamphlet in which he paints the rascalities of the head of the Democratic party in San Francisco, Chris. Buckley, the blind boss.

Buckley is painted in colors of striking naturalness, and a picture which everyone recognizes to be absolutely true in all its loathsome details.

The papers predict that the exposure of the crooked ways of the boss will result in his overthrow.

This is all humbug. The Democratic party is not in the habit of deposing its bosses because they are rotten. Buckley is precisely the kind of a boss the Democrats of California have been looking for for years. He is a boss who gathers all the spoils into one place and divides them equitably with the wolves who howl about the crib; that is, he takes fifty per cent. for himself, and gives the gang the balance.

The Democratic party has been for years seeking a boss who did not hog it all; the boss who makes even divy will always get along with the party, and he will not be overthrown until he reaches out for 60 per cent. and gives the wolves 40; then his downfall is only a matter of waiting for the next election.

Buckley is unquestionably the primest rascal that ever ruled a municipality, but he is the typical Democratic boss, suits his party to a dot, and fitly represents it.

The Democracy long ago gave up as uncertain the idea of ruling National politics, and circumstances have massed the Bourbons in large cities, where they combine for purposes of plunder and prey upon the municipal treasury.

New York, in its palmy days of corruptness, wasn't a marker to the pestilential political methods that now rule San Francisco.

Tweed, Connolly, Saegeny, and men of that ilk, were all wiped out, and they were in jails and foreign lands. They were overthrown because the Democracy got sick of the 60 and 40 per cent. divy. Buckley will not be overthrown in San Francisco, because he makes and equal divy.

A Democratic boss can hold for life as long as he makes an even divy with the gang. Buckley is too sharp to take any mean advantage of his following, and will not be unhorsed.

THE SILVER PARTY.

During the campaign the voters of Nevada had the assurance from the Republican press and the public speakers of the party that in the event of Harrison's election, there would be a resumption of coinage operations at the Mint. The voters of the State having every reason to believe these assertions, replied by giving Harrison the largest percentage of votes given by any State in the Union. Since that time, the Democratic organs have been sarcastically calling for the Mint to open, and been laboring hard to convince the people that dust had been thrown in their eyes, and that the Republican friendship to the white metal was a pretense and a sham.

In the midst of this endeavor to misrepresent the party of silver and progress, comes the announcement that Secretary Windom had ordered the resumption of coinage at the Carson Mint. This struck the Democrats like a thunderclap, but it was not a surprise to the leading Republicans of this State.

The Nevada delegation knew before they left the Chicago Convention that Harrison was a friend of silver, and the silver men of Colorado and other Western States knew that the change from Cleveland to Harrison meant that the guerrilla warfare on silver would cease within a reasonable time after Harrison's inauguration.

Our delegation at Chicago showed good sense when it fell in line for Harrison, and our present delegation at Washington have shown themselves to be men of the right

stamp for the fight they promised to make for silver, they have made and won.

Not long ago, Geo. Cassidy, in the Sentinel, assured the people that he was for any administration that befriended silver.

The arms of the Republican party are not exactly outstretched to receive him, but he can come into camp if he wants to.

GIBRALTAR will make the Season of 1889, at the Ranch, Carson City, Nev., commencing March 1st, and ending September 1st. Terms, \$40 the season with the privilege of return if the mare is not with foal, or \$60 to insure a foal.
