A WHIRL WIND.

He was about four feet ahead of the box, and every time he tried to dodge, the box headed him off, until it ran him up into the alley back of the store and he escaped by climbing the fence. TESTING HIS LEGS.—WINNEMUCCA (Nev.), April 14.—Sult has been brought in the District Court here by J. H. McMillan and Attorney General Alexander in behalf of A. C. Hamilton against the Southern Pacific Company for \$100,000. The complaint alleges that Hamilton, who had a first-class ticket from Omaha to San Diego, was arrested at the instance of the defendants for refusing to leave the train or sign his ticket. The facts are that last January, Hamilton, who has traveled from Omaha to this place without signing his ticket refused to do so or leave the train, and drew a pistol to prevent the train men from ejecting him. He was arrested at the next station by local officers, tried before a magistrate and acquitted. Lawyers say that the trial of this case will determine whether a passenger must sign a first-class ticket or not.

OUR MORAL STATE.—The District Attorney has decided that glove matches are illegal and the Supreme Court have agreed that keeping saloons open after the midnight hour is unconstitutional. It looks as if the State was getting its moral clothes on. Yet after all the liberty of the people is not particularly restricted. A man who rises up early enough in the morning can get reasonably drunk by midnight and as to gambling, he can find good reliable short card poker games all over town if he wants them bad. A man's life need not be exactly a void if he doesn't have a glove match every night in the week and he can rest easy in the fact that the Spring fist fights are not prohibited under the Constitution, and he can go out and punch his neighbor in the nose any time by paying a slight fine.

THE WIND STORM.—Yesterday Carson was visited by one of the severest and most disagreeable wind storms of the season. The gale came over the mountains in a gusty uncertain way in the morning, and then increased to a steady tempest, filling the air with clouds of dust, and driving nearly everybody off the streets.

Such a wind could not fail to do considerable damage to growing grain, as it whipped the tender shoots with fine gravel and cutting sand beating them to the ground. All the ranchers are complaining of the damage, although it is thought that a good rain would repair the damage in a few days.

OPENING OF THE ORMSBY.—Mr. D. Yesterday morning G. Raffetto was coming down from the mountains with a load of wood and on the hill near Musgrove's ranch and near the old mill, he lost control of the team and the horses came down the grade at a break neck pace overturning the load of wood. Raffetto fell forward under the wheels, one of which, passed over his breast, the wood falling upon him in a heap. A man who was with him took the wood off him and came to the city afoot for medical aid. A team was sent out and he was brought to his home in the afternoon. He was unable to speak when he reached the city and his life despaired of.

Stevenson, Governor of the State of Nevada, do request the people of the State to assemble on Tuesday, the 30th day of April, 1889, and observe the day as seems most fit and proper for the citizens of the State; and I request that they refrain from their usual vocations and devote the day to ceremonies commemorative of the blessings that have been handed down to us as a people.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the State of Nevada to be affixed. Done at Carson City, Nevada, this 11th day of April, A. D. 1889.
