THE NEW ROAD.

The Most Feasible Route of All.

The Lyon County Times says: There is hardly a doubt now that the Union Pacific Railroad Company will have a road into San Francisco at no far distant day. For months past surveyors have been traveling over the hills and plains of this State with the object of finding the most feasible and shortest route across the State and over the Sierra Nevada mountains into California.

While several routes have been reconnoitered, the one that would benefit our country the greatest is that which after leaving Austin runs West to a point near Wadsworth and then follows the Carson river, to a certain extent, to Carson City, and thence up the Carson Valley, crossing the mountains through the old Emigrant pass. This route is said to be considered a very favorable one by the surveyors, and it is said will be in the neighborhood of one hundred miles shorter than any other proposed line. Anybody can see that the advantages that would be derived from such a move would be great.

Lyon county is already considerable of a cattle county, and it would be a great deal more convenient for our cattle men to drive their stock to any point on the new road to ship than it is for them to drive to Wadsworth. Freights and fares would be cheaper if there was competition, and with a system of irrigation and water storage that is now being inaugurated in the State a large area of good farming country would grow up along the line in this county as well as in Churchill county. This proposed route would cross the Sierra at a considerable distance South of the Beckwith pass, and there would be but little snow encountered in the winter. It costs the C. P. road a fortune every winter to keep its snow sheds repaired and the track clear. All this would be avoided by crossing at the Emigrant pass. Another thing; the road would be one of the finest scenic routes in the world. It would come very close to the Yosemite Valley, and also pass within a few miles of Lake Tahoe. With the Union Pacific running through to San Francisco and the C. & C., to Moajave, Nevada would be pretty well fixed and could get to any part of the Golden State on short notice.


