ATTEMPTED ASSASSINATION.—The

 A dastardly attempt at assassination was made upon Superintendent Price and George W. Peltier about half past 2 o'clock this morning, by exploding dynamite under their bedrooms. The first explosion took place under the corner of Mr. Price's bedroom, blowing up the woodshed and wrecking the furniture inside the building and shaking that gentleman up considerably. About two minutes later the powder under Mr. Peltier's room exploded. It was here that the greatest damage was done, nearly the whole side of the house being torn out, the bedstead broken to pieces and the whole interior of the room wrecked and Mr. Peltier thrown out of bed.

PACIFIC COAST ITEMS.

Oregon has many tourists, and immigration promises to be heavy this season.

Petaluma citizens are asking for an ordinance fixing the liquor license at \$75 a quarter.

Ashland, Or., physicians have agreed to charge for mileage, \$1 per mile, as part of their fee.

The name of the Postoffice at Ingrams, Sonoma Co., Cal., has been changed to Cazadero.

Mosquitoes and Gila monsters are noticed in the Yuma Sentinel as having arrived for the season.

Heavy rains continue to fall all over Western and Southern Oregon, and splendid crops are assured.

David Powell, a farmer living twelve miles from Stockton, was killed in a runaway Wednesday. He was about 50 years old.

The San Diego Republican Central Committee has asked State Senator W. W. Bowers to resign. He acted independent of that party at the last election.

H. C. McKenzie and Dan Lynch, both ex-policemen, became involved in a shooting scrape at Los Angeles Wednesday night, resulting in both being wounded, though not seriously.

The United States Grand Jury has indicted Bartholomew Coffey, the Indian Agent at the Umatilla Reservation, charging him with the embezzlement of Government funds.

Gerst Bremen, the fellow who was beaten by Captain Kuhn at San Pedro the other day for interfering with his domestic relations, was tarred and feathered Tuesday night and left tied to an electric pole.

Austin A. Bell, a prominent and wealthy citizen of Seattle, W. T., committed suicide in his office Wednesday morning by shooting himself in the head with a revolver. Despondency caused by ill-health led to the suicide.

The case of the Rev. George W. James of the Methodist Church, of Long Beach, who has been on trial for lying, deceit and immorality on twenty-three charges before Presiding Elder VanCleve and a jury of seven Methodist Clergymen, was concluded Wednesday, and James was suspended until action of the annual conference on the subject.

A. N. Polymath, a jeweler of San Diego, has been sentenced to pay a fine of \$500 for unlawfully detaining and searching a woman and her husband, whom he charged with stealing rings. He had played the same trick on people at San Francisco, San Jose and other places. Suits for defamation of character have also been entered against Polymath.

Nevada ought to be proud of the race horses raised by Theo. Winters. His Czar at the Bay District track at San Francisco, on Saturday last, made a mile and a half in 2:36, being the fastest time ever made in America, and beating Ben Ali's time at Louisville by half a second.

Mike Fay of Carson Valley was in town yesterday. He says the snow on the head waters of Carson river in Alpine county, is melting very fast and that the crops will be about the same as last year.

Joseph Powning, who for over twenty years has been connected with the California Powder Works, most of the time as manager, has retired from that position. Mr. Powning is an uncle of General U. C. Powning of Reno.


CEMETERY WATER. At the annual meeting of the Board of Directors of the Cemetery water works, April 13th 1889 it was
