BREYFOGLE AGAIN.

Reported Discovery of a lost Ledge of Fabulous Richness

The Alturas Era gives a long account of the discovery of the long lost Breyfogle ledge in Humboldt county in this State. The assays run from \$800 to \$80,000 in gold. The discovery of a fabulously rich ledge may be true, but there are strong doubts of it being any ledge which Breyfogle (not Dreyfogle as the Era has it) ever saw. Breyfogle used to live in this city and spent most of his life leading credulous people off into the mountains to see ledges which he had discovered.

GOLD IN DOUGLAS.—The discovery of gold on the East fork of the Carson is causing quite a lively excitement in Douglas county. 
