LAKE TAHOE.

Notes from All Around the Health Resort.

The Truckee Republican has the following notes from Lake Tahoe:

The weather has been most inclement during the past few weeks. Rain, then a light fall of snow, a few pleasant days, and then a furious wind prevailed for several days which was a regular hurricane, and at the present time squalls are frequent, with no prospect of settled weather.

The Lake is receding fast, and the Truckee river is reduced to a mere creek in consequence.

Fishing was never better. Hundreds of pounds have been shipped during the past month. The average weight is from three to five pounds, and there is frequently a ten-pounder.

Most of the logging camps are running with a full complement. They are now rafting logs that were banked last Fall. About four rafts a week are sent across the Lake, and the supply does not quite meet the demand. Two steamers do the towing—the Emerald and the Meteor.

Wednesday the mail steamer makes the last trip on the Winter schedule. The next six months we have daily mail. It is a remarkable fact that during the Winter schedule the steamer missed but one trip on its regular day. The mild Winter greatly favored navigation on the Lake.

The new steamer so much talked of has proved to be a myth, and the old rotten Niagara is being repaired for towing purposes it is stated, but is the opinion of many that it is past redemption.

The Supervisors have at last come to the rescue of the Tahoe people, and reduced the rate of toll on the road between Tahoe and Truckee. It has been a gross outrage for years. Several efforts have been made in that direction before, but without success, and one of our oldest citizens made a noble effort at his own expense to have the rate reduced, and a law suit was the result without victory, and a loss of several thousand dollars. J. B. Scott, of Squaw Valley, finally succeeded in having the reduction made, and Tahoe is rejoicing over his success.

It is rumored that a new boarding house will shortly open. Hotel accommodations are insufficient for the early Spring travel, and the new house will without doubt be a success.

TROTTLING STOCK.—Carson was never so full of trotting stock as at present. Almost every one who makes any pretensions to being horse lovers, has a trotting colt, breaking it in and these colts are valued from \$500 up. Gibraltar's get are fast coming to the front as lightning stayers and on every side we hear of fine strains of stock being brought in to keep improving the breeds already doing so well in Nevada.

THE VIRGINIA SHOOTING.

On Thursday evening, in Virginia City, Dave Crosby shot and killed Geo. Miller, and seriously wounded Michael Egan. According to Crosby's certified statement, the affray occurred about as follows:

Crosby had been telling Miller's mother that her son was getting to be worthless, and Miller hearing of it, accosted him called him some vile names, striking at him at the same time.

Crosby warded the blow and hit Miller behind the ear. Crosby then went up street, and was shortly afterwards followed by Miller and Egan. When Crosby arrived near his house, Miller stepped up to him and taking him by the coat collar said: "Look at my ear where you struck me; this thing must be settled right here." Then Egan stepped up and said to Miller: "Why don't you give it to him?" It was at this juncture that Crosby fired the two shots with the above results.

Crosby also says that he was told that Miller had threatened to kill him, and that he had better have him arrested, but he declined to do so.


