### A WELCOME STORM.

Rain and snow shower Wealth Upon the State.

The storm of Sunday was about the largest-sized blessing that the State could have received at this time.

For two weeks the weather has been shaping for rain, but the disappointment was so frequent that people about gave up the idea of a storm.

About 11 o'clock on Saturday night, a gentle, drizzling rain began to fall, and came down steadily all night.

In the morning the weather turned colder, and a regular old fashioned snow storm set in. The temperature was just barely cold enough for snow, and the flakes were large and moist, melting as fast as they struck the ground.

In the mountains, however, there were twelve hours of good, solid snow storm, and it came down in a shape that carried joy into the hearts of the wood and lumber men, as well as the ranchers in the valleys.

The storm was general all over the State and Coast, and the fear that the ranges would suffer from drought is no longer entertained by anyone.

The Carson river and all its tributaries are running full. All along the line of the C. & C. it stormed most of the day, Sunday.

The rain was specially welcome in Mason Valley, where a short hay crop was feared. It snowed heavily in Candelaria, and the storm extended to Eureka.

The benefits of so general a storm can scarcely be estimated. The grain and hay get it just at the right time, and the ranges are saved.

At the present writing it has not cleared up, and the indications are that there will be more of it.

The snow in the mountains was about two and a half feet up to Sunday night, and the last report is five feet back of Jack's Valley. The stage which left here yesterday returned, being unable to get through to Glenbrook.

The following official report is made of the storm by the Weather Service.

OFFICE OF THE NEVADA WEATHER SERVICE, CARSON, MAY 6, 1889.

On the morning of the 4th the barometer began falling and fell steadily up to yesterday morning, the 5th, when it began to rise again.

The storm first manifested itself by rain, which began on the night of the 4th at 11:30 p. m.; the rain continued until 9:53 a. m. of the 5th, when it turned into a heavy and moist snow, lasting until 12:55 p. m., when it again turned into rain, lasting exactly one hour to 1:55 p. m., when it once more began to snow heavily until 8:25 p. m., at which time the sky began to clear up.

The total amount of unmelted snow falling on the ground although but an inch deep, when melted gave, including the amount of rain, one inch and thirty eight hundredths (.38) of precipitation.

The rain and snow fell heavily from 7 a. m. to 2 p. m. yesterday. Grave fears were entertained of a killing frost last night owing to the sudden clearing up, but as far as can be ascertained not much damage was done. With the exception of a small snow storm on the 15th of May, 1883, this is the heaviest rain and snow storm on record for the last 10 years.

This storm to all appearances appears to have been general all over Nevada and California since the night of the 4th.

Unlike preceding storms, the surrounding hills north, south, east and west have all received a goodly share of this most bountiful and unexpected precipitation of moisture. The disastrous drouth which threatened this section of the country for months past has at last been broken and at present the prospects are more cheering than they have been at any time this season.

It is claimed that he desired to be made administrator of the Raffetto estate, and his failure to secure the office he regarded as a slight, and killed himself.




