Mr. Glenn was well known throughout Esmeralda county having been one of the leading citizens for many years. "Mac," as he was familiarly known, was editor and proprietor of the Esmeralda Herald during the last few years of its existence in Aurora and while it was being published in Hawthorne. He was also a County Commissioner of Esmeralda during the term of 1883 and '84. The cause of his insanity is not known.


THE DOUGLAS GOLD FIELDS.—The excitement regarding the gold fields of Douglas is dying out. 
