VIOLATING THE LIQUOR LAW.

Friday afternoon District Attorney Torreyson lodged a complaint in the Justice Court, charging George Thaxter with misdemeanor in retailing spurious liquor without a license. As Mr. Thaxter was sick in bed when the complaint was made, no order will be issued for his arrest until he is able to be served.

The charge on which the complaint was based was sworn to by members of the Nevada Liquor Dealers' Association, and is the outgrowth of the law compelling the liquor dealers to close at midnight. The retail liquor dealers say that they have been compelled to observe the early closing law, of which Thaxter was a strenuous advocate in the Legislature.

They claim that one of the main objects of the law was to drive the liquor trade from the saloons to the drug stores, which are accepted from the provisions of the Act.

They claim that Thaxter is doing a regular retail business; selling liquor by the glass, and paying no license for doing so. The Association is no longer fighting the law, but insisting on its enforcement for all alike. Other druggists in other parts of the State who are found selling whiskey without a regular license will be also proceeded against. The retail liquor men say they will enforce the law to its full letter.

Yesterday another complaint was sworn to charging Thaxter with violating the 12 o'clock closing law by selling liquor after midnight. The witnesses in the case were ordered to appear at the Justice Court at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning.

Robert Brown, employed on J. R. Williams' ranch, about twelve miles from Sacramento city, on the Auburn road, fell from a scaffolding Thursday and had both legs broken.

Hail-stones so large that six of them weighed a pound are said to have fallen at Placerville Wednesday. Fowls struck by them were killed and live stock were driven almost frantic. Fruit trees were stripped not only of their fruit, but their foliage as well, and other trees suffered severely. It was the hardest hail storm yet known in that region.


