THE CASE OF DAVID CROSBY

David Crosby, a grocer and coal dealer of Virginia city, is cursed with an unfortunate proclivity of temperament, which is constantly involving him in personal altercation. A few days ago he shot a man dead and wounded another so that his life is despaired of. The Grand Jury ignored the bill and we think, from a legal standpoint, they were justified. The men were following Crosby up and calling to Crosby to "pull your gun." Under these circumstances, no jury in this State would convict a man of murder. At the same time, the shooting was uncalculated for, as neither of the men shot by Crosby were armed. People frequently call upon others to draw, as a bluff, in this instance, the penalty of bluffing was death. At the same time, Crosby, after drawing his weapon, need not have fired. He could have covered his opponents with it and that would have been the end of it. There was no occasion for bloodshed until he saw either of the men make a motion to draw, and this motion would never have been made.

The taking of a human life is a very serious matter and no man who wants to stand respected by his fellows, will resort to pistols until it becomes a matter of protecting his own life and there are no other means available. If our memory is not at fault, this is the fourth time Crosby has been in shooting scrapes. He will probably keep on until he dies with his boots on.

UGHT TO RESIGN.—On Sunday evening, the Deputy Sheriff of Storey county took a thief to Virginia city who was wanted in Storey for stealing a hand car from the V. & T. The deputy, who had a pair of hand cuffs in his pocket, did not think it necessary to use them and while the prisoner was loitering about the platform he ran away. The deputy fired two shots but they did not reach the fugitive, who is still at large.
