Serious Accident.
GRASS VALLEY, July 30.—Yesterday seven Knights Templar went to Dutch flat in a strong mountain wagon to attend the funeral of Charles Kopp, a deceased brother Knight. The party waited until late on account of the heat before returning home. William Freeman drove the team, which was a spirited one. On arriving at a place nine miles east, the wagon went off Bear river grade, and the passengers were thrown down the hill. The Knights who met with the mishap are Edw. Coleman, John Hicks, David Binkelman, Theo. Wilhelm, Stephen Long, William Dunster and William E. Deamer. All escaped serious injury, excepting David Binkelman, who had his shoulder broken. Stephen Long has two ribs and William E. Deamer is badly bruised and is very sick this morning. Edward Coleman says his fall was at least fifty feet long, and he and Deamer were caught under the wagon, which lodged against a rock, and when it was lifted they rolled still further down the hill. The wagon is broken and the horses skinned badly.

FIRE AT BAILEY'S RANCH.—A fire at Bailey's ranch, on the Big Bend of the Carson river last Sunday destroyed his barn and other out-buildings and about 500 tons of hay stacked on the premises. The residence of Mr. Bailey was saved from the flames by great exertions on the part of the ranch employes. The fire is supposed to have originated in a stack where some persons camped the night before. Mr. Bailey's loss is estimated at about \$10,000. The barn was a fine structure and cost \$3,000. Included in the property destroyed were the extensive cattle corrals, sheds and feed troughs on the premises, in which could be stalled 500 head of cattle. A wagon with a derrick was also burned.

THE TERRIBLE DROUGHT.—Distressing accounts of the loss of cattle from the scarcity of water along the river continue to reach here. From Humboldt House west the water holes in the river bed are said to be lined with the decomposed carcasses of dead animals. The water in the sloughs and holes is impregnated with alkali, and when cattle, almost dying with thirst, reach them from the plains, they drink enough of the poisonous water to kill them. A similar condition exists on the Little Humboldt, and the petrifying carcasses of cattle are said to be numerous between Riel's ranch and Willow Point.—Silver State.

PACIFIC COAST ITEMS.

George Cornwall, a jockey, was killed at San Diego Monday. While jumping a fence his horse fell upon him.

A whole family of Flathead Indians has been murdered and burned by robbers in the Sun River country in Montana.

L. B. Allen and a companion, from San Diego, who left for Oceanside to sail a small yacht down the coast, are missing and it is feared they are drowned.

Tom Thompson and six other men who tarred and feathered Gus Brannan at San Pedro a few months ago, have been found guilty of simple assault.

A sunken sloop was found near Coal Island, B. C., last Thursday by some Indians. They towed the vessel ashore and found in the hold thirteen kegs of whiskey, a case of bitters, a Winchester rifle and lots of stores.

The Lakeview Examiner says: Bill Lamb is coming to the front with a unique enterprise. He is canning the hams of jack rabbits and shipping them East. He is working in the best field in the country, the sagebrush plains of Tick Ridge. Four thousand have been salted down up to date. Geese are also being slain by the hundreds and the feathers saved up for shipment East.

As Rich as John L.
PHILADELPHIA, July 31.—Charles Osbaun, a 15-year old newsboy, received to-day a check for \$20,623 50 from the Philadelphia Traction Company in payment of a judgment and interest, obtained against the corporation for injuries received by an accident in one of the company's cable cars.

The first verdict obtained by the boy was for \$12,000; from this the company appealed, and the second verdict was for \$18,000.

The company then appealed to the higher court, which fixed the amount at \$20,000. When handed his check to-day Osbaun said gleefully: "I've got as much money as John L. Sullivan."

To Be Extradited.
WINNEPEG, July 30.—A full court gave judgment at noon to-day in the Burke appeal. Judgment was delivered by Chief Justice Taylor, Judge Dubase and Judge Killam. All concurred in the finding that there were no grounds for reversing the action of Judge Bain, who committed Burke on extradition. Burke, therefore, goes back as soon as the necessary order comes from Ottawa.

A Severe Shock.
SAN FRANCISCO, July 31.—One of the heaviest shocks of earthquake felt in this city for years occurred here about 4:45 o'clock this morning. The people were awakened by the rattling of windows and shaking of buildings. No damage is reported.

Destroyed by Earthquake.
YOKOHAMA, July 30.—A dispatch received from Nagsaki to-day reports a terrible earthquake in the Western parts of the island Kiu Siou, the Southernmost island of the group. Details have not yet been received, but it is certain that terrible damage has been done. The city of Kumamoio, containing nearly 50,000 people, has been entirely destroyed and the loss of life is frightful. Not even an approximate idea of the loss of life can yet be formed. The damage to property is enormous.


