In the suit of W. S. Chapman against the Bank of California, arising out of the wheat deals of Isaac Friedlander, twelve or fourteen years ago, Judge Hodge gave judgement for the bank Friday. The suit involved \$1,500,000.

On Wednesday last Mr. Robert Lyon, formerly of Nevada, died at Ventura Cal., of rheumatism. Deceased was an uncle of Mrs. J. G. Fox, also of Messrs Dorsey and Warren Noteware of this city. He was about 55 years of age and a native of Illinois.

DYING FISH.—On Wednesday last two men were hired by Fish Commissioner Mills to go down to the large dam constructed by Theo. Winters at the lower end of Washoe Lake, for the purpose of saving a large quantity of fish congregated there. The two men labored all day and far into the night, saving thousands of fish from perishing in the stagnant, shallow pools formed by the dam aforementioned. The action of Mr. Mills in this matter is deserving of high commendation and will no doubt be appreciated by a large number of sport-loving people.

The dam has been the subject of much severe criticism, as it not only affords a tremendous death trap for the fish, but is also the means of drying up the lake. It is presumed that the dam is for the purpose of creating feed for Mr. Winters' cattle, but certain it is, that the obstruction to the natural flow of water is very damaging to all sporting interests connected with Washoe Lake. The lake has never before been known to be so low, and it is obvious that if those who own it are persistent in maintaining that dam, the future life of our pleasant little lake will be very brief.

An APPEAL reporter has since learned that there are still many thousands of fish left in a very precarious condition in some of the pools about a quarter of a mile from the lake. D. Circo has expressed a willingness to go out there with a force of men and complete the work of transferring the fish from the pools to the lake. The cost of the work will be about \$15, which ought easily to be raised among Carson fishermen. Expedience is absolutely essential, and it is to be hoped that those interested will facilitate matters as much as possible.

Natural Gas Explosion.

Pittsburg, Aug. 10.—Yesterday, while a 30-inch natural-gas main was being tested the dead cap on one end of the pipe blew out, scattering debris in every direction. Several hundred workmen employed in the mills near by were just returning home, and a number of them had stopped along the trench to watch the experiment. They were struck by debris and flying missiles, as though a bomb had exploded. The pipe was braced with heavy timber, and these were hurled into the crowd with terrific force. The workmen and spectators were thrown down by the force of the explosion, and one of them killed. He was hurled against a brick house and had his neck broken.

A general stampede followed. The cries of the injured could be heard for several squares. An investigation showed that two men had been killed outright and about fifty others injured, two of them fatally.

The Jap Defeated.

SEATTLE August, 9.—Matsada Sorakichi and W. H. Quinn wrestled to-night before 1,000 spectators for \$500 and the heavy-weight championship of the Coast. The Jap entered the contest against the order of his physician and lost the match. He was still suffering from a cold contracted some time since, and was feverish and weak. A half hour before going on the stage he said to a friend: "Don't bet on me, for it's nearly sure I'll lose."

Knocked Out by Jackson.

New York, August 10.—Three thousand people were present at the slogging bout between Peter Jackson and Ginger McCormack at Hoboken last evening. Jackson offered McCormack \$100 to stand up for four rounds of three minutes each. McCormack was knocked out in the second round.




