Removal of Bridges.

Col. Lyman Bridges has been summarily relieved from duty as engineer of this, the L. Hontan Division, and Wm. Ham Hall, who has supervision over all the districts west of the Wasatch mountains, has been ordered for the time, in addition to his duty as Supervising Engineer of the California Division, to take executive charge of all the work in the L. Hontan Division also.

It is said that the money allotted to this division has been expended much more rapidly than was expected, and that because of this, the season's work here must soon be closed and the field parties disbanded. Mr. Hall has been about the district for several days past, says the Reno Journal, but is now in San Francisco. He will soon return for a general examination over the field of the surveys, preparatory to making a report on Nevada's irrigation prospects, to Director Powell in Washington.

Running Charges of Bribery.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—There was quite a scene in the Equity Court yesterday in which Benjamin F. Butler figured. Butler for a year has been the attorney of Samuel Strong, who had a large claim against the Government. An award of \$47,000 was recently given Strong and Butler filed a suit for \$30,000 of the amount for money advanced and as part of his fees. He produced a contract signed by Strong, allowing him that sum. Strong pronounced it a forgery. General Butler pleaded for an alteration of the record which would not show the charge of forgery against him. He grew pathetic; then he denounced Strong in bitter terms, branding him as a forger and declaring that he ought to be behind the bars of a prison.

Strong's attorney said that if it were not for the infirmities of the witness the gates of the penitentiary would open for Benjamin Butler.

Sixty days' time was finally given for the production of desired testimony on the charges of forgery brought by both sides.

F. Eugene Clark is charged by the Coroner's Jury at Tacoma with killing Annie Dickenson, who was found murdered Sunday morning.

To Modesto's refusal to vote for bonds for the City Water Works is attributed a 50 per cent advance on insurance policies in Modesto by the Pacific Insurance Union.

Men are still fighting the forest fires near Downsville. The neighboring atmosphere is filled with smoke.

Henry R. Hall, a printer who had some money, is believed to have been robbed and murdered at San Diego. He was not a drinking man, and was supposed to have no enemies. He has been missing since Thursday.

One of the gas wells at Stockton is down 1,250 feet. The deposit at that depth is a hard, close gravel that is much water worn and belonged to an ocean bank or bed of a river. Some fine specimens of black oak petrification were brought up last week.


