THE CATTLE QUESTION.

Losses Resulting from not Storing Water.

The bluest lot of men in America to-day are the cattle raisers of Nevada.

Two dry and open winters, insufficient pasturage and the prospect of a severe winter ahead threaten to annihilate their herds.

J. W. Dorsy, a prominent attorney of Nevada, is now stopping at the Palace. To a Post reporter he said to-day: "It has been years since things looked so blue and hopeless. Time was when ordinary stock cattle were worth twice and three times as much as now. The succession of dry winters has brought an unparalleled scarcity of water and pasturage. In summer thousands of cattle have starved to death virtually, and if they will die in the summer what are we to expect this winter?"

"Thousands of head have been driven this summer into Idaho, Oregon, Montana and the Snake river country, cattlemen from Winnemucca east preferring to risk the northern winter than to let their cattle remain. Others have driven their herds into southern Nevada for the mild winter, counting on a severe winter up north to bring out plenty of pasturage in the spring.

"For a Nevada cattleman to-day to stay still is dangerous to the herds. If the coming winter is severe the cattle will die of cold; if it is open they will die of starvation in the spring.

"There has lately been quite a movement of sheep in the state. Many new flocks are to be found all over, and there is some talk of establishing a wool warehouse in Reno. I can't say that their project has materialized yet. The cattle business on a great scale is doomed anyway, and the people are beginning to look to sheep and to agriculture through irrigation as a means of support. Though silver is low and cattle are \$8 to \$10 a head, we are still hopeful, and if Congress will give the irrigation scheme a chance for its life, we will have a great State yet. We've got the land. All we want is water.

SWARMING BUTTERFLIES.—Yesterday something over a million butterflies invaded Carson and filled the town. About 10 o'clock, they were so plenty in places that they frightened horses in the streets. They only collected in the streets which had been wet down by the watering cart and avoided the dry spots. This led many to believe that they came in from the country to get water. They were rather small and had almost black wings trimmed with gold. They seemed all of the same variety. People in Empire noted the same curious visitors. They seemed every where and as thousands were on the ground waving their black and yellow wings, they looked quite picturesque. Some think they are the forerunner of a big invasion of worms next season, but Friend, who is something of a scientist says he thinks there is nothing to fear from this source.

Besides horses, there will be offered for sale, Holstein, Durham, Polled Angus and Hereford cattle in endless variety. Lawrence Frey of Genoa will be here with several head of heavy young work horses, which will be sold to the highest bidder for cash. A SUICIDE.—Joseph Powning, a cousin of C. C. Powning of the Reno Journal, committed suicide in Virginia City Wednesday evening by sending a bullet through his brain. Deceased was only 28 years old, and domestic trouble is said to have caused the rash act. His wife having left him a few months since.


