THE FOURTH DAY.

Another Day of Fine Racing at the State Fair.

AN INFORMAL IRRIGATION MEETING IN THE PAVILION.

The Crowd Increasing—High Rates—Poor Hay.

RENO, October 2d. The town seems to be more and more crowded daily. There being no depot hotel since the fire makes matters rather crowded for strangers, and private houses are being called into requisition to accommodate the guests.

The Sacramento horsemen have already got the race track and pool box well in hand. Yesterday's "2:20 race" demonstrated this, when the best time was 2:33 1/2, and in the third heat the leading horse, which came in at the stretch twelve lengths ahead, passed second under the wire, on which occasion the short enders on the Paris Mutuals reaped a five to one harvest.

POOR HAY. There never was a time when stock exhibitors could purchase good feed on the grounds at Reno. This year the hay is worse than ever and correspondingly high in price.

If booked for entry it would have to be in the four-year-old class or nothing, and is sufficiently musty to cause even hungry stock to turn up their noses.

One cannot look in any direction from the grounds and not see immense stacks of hay, yet if one wants it on the grounds, an inferior and high priced quality must be accepted or the country must be scoured for other.

Stock exhibitors have complained of this annoyance for years, but it seems to go on just the same.

BILL CHAMBERLAIN, JUDGE. Bill Chamberlain, landlord of the Riverside, has not been in the Judge's Stand during the Fair, although offered \$250 by the Board to do so for the week. Chamberlain is the best Judge on the Coast, and one of the best in the United States.

His presence in the Judge's Stand has a good moral effect on the drivers, for they know that he will pull the rules very close. They seldom attempt any nonsense with him, and if they do they are disciplined at once.

For some reason or another he declined to judge at Reno and also Carson, although the Carson Board offered him good inducements.

He seems to have some sort of a disgust about something, and has "scratched" all judging engagements for the year 1889.

This is a source of general regret. The position of Judge is a very delicate one, and few men are able to fill it satisfactorily. More men in Nevada can be found who could creditably fill the office of a Judge of the Supreme Bench than Judge of a horse race.

RECENT ELECTIONS. The way the new States have swung into line by handsome Republican majorities is the subject of general congratulation down here. These States, will be given special premiums by Uncle Sam at the National Fair.

THE RACES. The race between Painkiller and Winters' Noretta was won by the latter in 1:28.

The running race of a mile and a sixteenth and repeat was won by Dave Douglass, in 1:56. Parole second.

The five-eighths of mile race for the two-year olds was won by Florence A. from Winters' stable, over Hascall, Hezog and Eds in 1:03.

Rondo won the three-eighths in 35.

The five-eighths dash with Lulu, Sadie C., Constellation and Candor was won by Constellation.

IRRIGATION. During the afternoon there was an informal meeting of representative citizens from all over the State to exchange views on the irrigation question. Senator Jones being at the Fair it was decided to get a few men to-

gether in the room under the Pavilion and have a general talk.

The Washoe people who were present did not like the idea of paying the State so much interest on the money advanced and then give the State the profits. That was their understanding of the law. Senator Williams thought otherwise, and the Washoe people said they would rather take hold of the Enterprise with their own capital and also reap the profits. The idea was generally shared by business men, and Senator Williams said that this would be quite satisfactory to the Committee, as it would enable the Committee to use the State's money elsewhere.

THE CROWD INCREASING. People are still pouring into Reno, and the two bit lodging houses, taking advantage of the crush, are raising their rates to \$2.50 a night for a bed. This has occasioned great profanity and will do Reno no good.

The Riverside Hotel is so packed that the parlor floors are covered with cots at reducee rates.

There were two balloon ascensions yesterday, and the balloonist still lives.

Friday, (today), will be a good day all round with big races, etc., etc.

The Fair Directors spread champagne, baked trout and chicken every day for notables, and their kettledrums are well attended.

THE LATE ELECTIONS.

Montana Elects a Republican to Congress, but the Governor and Legislature in Doubt.

MINNEAPOLIS, Oct. 3.—The last returns make it appear that Prohibition was defeated in North Dakota by 12,000, though the Prohibitionists still claim the State by 500. In South Dakota Prohibition carried by 8,000 to 10,000. The State ticket is Republican by at least 20,000. Chairman Handley of the Democratic Central committee admits 12,000.

The Journal's Helena special says: Returns from outside precincts are coming in very slowly. Carter's (Rep.) election to Congress is conceded by the opposition. Both sides still claim the Governor but may require an official count to determine the election, so close is the race between Power and Toole.

This county shows a remarkable Democratic gains. Claims of mismanagement are heard from many sources. The Legislature still hangs in the balance. If Silver Bow county gives but three Republicans out of eleven the Legislature will be Republican. The majority of the State ticket is Republican, but the figures have been knocked into splinters. The count is proceeding slowly in larger precincts and it will be hours before a definite calculation may be made with safety.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—The President received a private dispatch from Montana today saying that Carter has been elected to Congress and that the Republicans have the Legislature. The Governorship is in doubt.

SIOUX FALLS, S. D., Oct. 3.—Sioux Falls concedes the temporary capital to Pierre. Prohibition carries by at least 5,000. The Republican State ticket is elected by 20,000.

How it Was Started.

There is quite an extensive fire in the woods on on the Sierra Valley road about six miles from Truckee and is destroying much timber. The fire originated as follows: A Sierra team loaded with lumber broke an axle at Katz's flat. The teamster camped for the night and kindled a fire in a log. In the morning he arose and went to Lonkey's for breakfast. The wind also arose about the same time, blew the campfire into a conflagration and destroyed the teamster's bed, harness, etc. This was retribution in blank verse. The fire has not since been under control.—Truckee Republican.




