THE FAIR.

A LARGE ATTENDANCE YESTERDAY.

Row Over the Baseball Decision.

There was a large crowd yesterday at the Fair. Reno sent up a good crowd, but of course not so large as Carson sent down to the State Fair last week.

THE BALL GAME.

The baseball game between the Comstocks and Amateurs for a purse of \$150, resulted in a wrangle. The clubs signed an agreement that the game should end at 12:30. At that hour the game was stopped by Dr. Lee and the game given to the Carson boys, as they had six points and their opponents four. Only seven innings were played.

The beaten club rent the air with howls of disappointment, and then filed a protest against the Directors' paying the money.

They also threatened a law suit, a mandamus before the Supreme Court and two ipsi dicit injunctions. The Fair Directors will put up no more baseball purses.

The fault lay in not beginning the game early enough.

The following is the agreement: This agreement made and entered into this 9th day of October, A. D. 1889, between Ormsby County Agricultural Association and Comstock Base Ball Club of Virginia City, Nevada, and the Amateur Base Ball Club of Carson, Nevada witnesseseth:

That said Ormsby County Agricultural Association, hereby agree to give to said baseball clubs herein before mentioned, the sum of \$150 for the winner of a match game of baseball to be played on the ground of the Ormsby County Agricultural Association on Friday morning, October 11, 1889, between the hours of 9:30 A. M. and 12:30 P. M.

AN AWFUL SIGHT.

An Electric Lineman Meets a Horrible Death in Mid-Air.

NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—An electric lineman met with a horrible death at the corner of Center and Chambers streets this afternoon from contact with an electric light wire. He was employed by the Western Union Company, and presented a terrible sight as he died on the network of wires in mid-air, while the deadly fluid actually made his body sizzle, and his blood poured out on the sidewalk and over the clothes of the horrified spectators.

The accident, occurring in the middle of the day and in one of the busiest parts of the city, was witnessed by a large crowd of people. The man's body lay limp and motionless over the cross-trees of the pole. Firemen brought out a ladder and one went up with a pair shears to cut the wires. The lineman was found to be dead.

The man's face was turned towards the sidewalk and in fifteen minutes half of it had been burned off. The victim's left arm was also seen to be burning and every few seconds the blue flames spurted out from various parts of his body. Hundreds of people stood shivering as they looked at the awful sight overhead. No one dared to go near and even the firemen's faces blanched with horror.

Lineman Benson, the dead man's comrade, was asked why he did not go up. He simply said: "It's no use; he's dead. I don't know the use; he's dead. I don't know the electric wires. I can't help him. I was on the other pole and don't know anything about it." All this was said in a catching, halting voice as if a man completely overcome with horror and emotion.

Immediately after the accident, Mayor Grant was notified. The Mayor gave orders that the wires which caused the accident be cut at once. His Secretary said that the Mayor would act promptly in the matter and it is possible that he may order the cutting of all electric light wires above ground to-night, whereupon a large part of the city will be in darkness.




